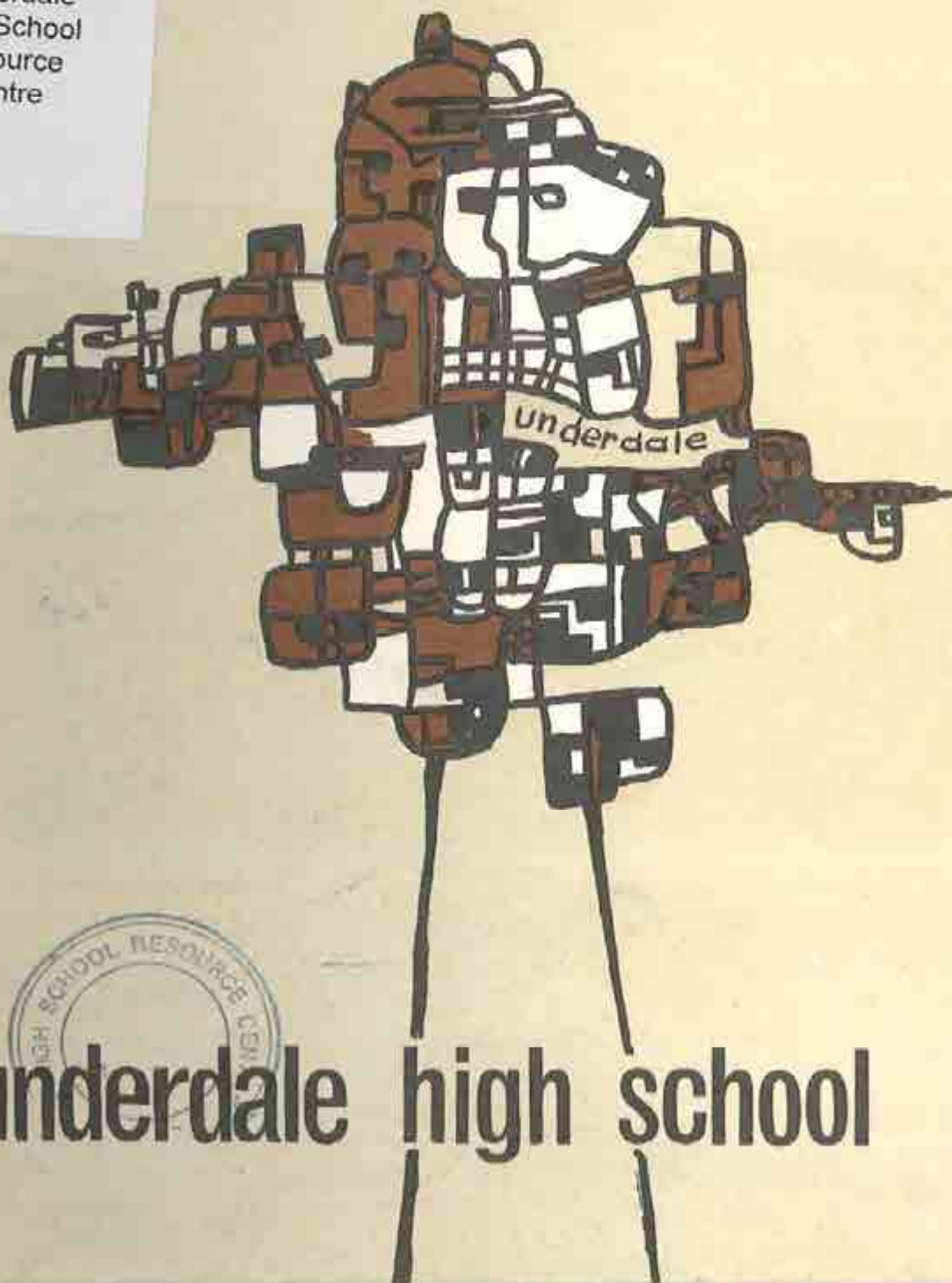

From the HEADMASTER

It seems to have become traditional to have a 'Headmaster's Page' in our school magazines; Underdale High School is apparently no exception, for I have been asked to contribute. To accept this invitation is both a privilege and a pleasure; it gives me the opportunity not only to express my appreciation, and that of the school, to Mr. Bates and his band of helpers for their time-consuming efforts to make such a fine publication possible, but also to add a few brief reflections after my first year as Headmaster of this fine School.

1968 has undoubtedly been a year of progress for Underdale High School - the establishment of Leaving courses, the successful introduction to the Prefect system, the work done on the development of the schoolgrounds and the numerous other worthwhile activities recorded in these pages are all witnesses to the progress that has been made. I am proud to have been associated with the people, the teachers, the parents and the students who have played a part in the achievement of these successes. My only regret is that not all of you have played the part you are capable of, and while you are reading through the various reports and look back on the School's activities during the past year, may I suggest that you ask yourself the following questions and try to find your own individual answers to them:

But they are vital for your full development as an individual and for the full appreciation of your responsibilities to yourself, to your family, to your school and to the community in which you live.

The democratic way of life which we enjoy and which we should cherish much more than we often do, demands much of us as individuals. In the modern world there is so much to know about Science and technology, about world politics and geography, and about important national and local issues, that the task before us seems almost impossible. Our dealings with other people, our attitude towards them and our appreciation and understanding of their opinions, and our willingness to accept responsibilities and obligations are also of vital importance if we are to make full use of our talents, both for our own advancement and for the improvement of conditions throughout the world. The responsibility to train yourselves properly to take your place in the community and to make a useful contribution to its well-being and to its improvement is therefore one that you must accept if all the ideals and dreams of mankind are to be achieved.

I can sum up in no better way than to quote from the 1966 message for youth from the United Nations Secretary-General, in which he said, "... my thoughts and hopes go out especially to you, young people in all countries, for the world of tomorrow will soon be in your keeping."

May I, in conclusion, take this opportunity to extend to you all the compliments of the season and best wishes for the future, whatever it may have in store for you, in the hope that what you have learned and the attitudes you have developed at school will help you to become whatever you are capable of being.

To many people, a school is a place where qualifications for a good job may be obtained. A school should be much more than this. One test of a good education is that people will use their leisure time pleasantly and profitably. A few words from me - one who has been on the staff of Underdale High School since its inception in February, 1965.

Over one hundred boys, sixty to seventy girls, and a staff of seven came together - the students on their first step forward from childhood to adulthood, the staff in their role as teachers and mentors - involved in this new venture, the start of a new school, with hopes of getting the best from our new associations, more important perhaps, of giving of our best. Our feelings in that first year were rather mixed for we could not use all the energies and ideas we had, nor the 'let's-get-to-work-and-get-this-done' spirit as we were housed in a building not our own. These feelings of uncertainty increased during the year as the dates of our moving were postponed in turn from May to July, to August and finally, when we moved into our own school in early December, the 'first fine careless rapture' had worn off.



In the succeeding years we had to recapture the feeling of adventure, the sense of creating something worthwhile and something of meaning from these lovely new buildings provided for us. From these efforts we have seen the School emerge as an entity with a spirit and character of its own. The students have emerged as individuals, moving in their own paths of education, in many instances fulfilling themselves as they became involved in the school life and their courses of study: some students, however, have not wished to become involved - have not given of their energies: These, perhaps, may regret having missed much of what makes schooldays a time to look back upon with thoughts of appreciation, satisfaction and pleasure.

To me, it has certainly not been only the staff and students who have built this school. From the earliest days the parents have been so very closely involved. They formed the different parent bodies, held regular meetings and organized fund-raising functions, etc., but their generosity was not confined to these more usual avenues of help. They made themselves available for many duties, in the library, at presentations, providing suppers, floral decorations - whatever we needed they provided. In all, they gave most lavishly of their time and money for the advancement of their children's education. Most gratifying has been the friendship and goodwill they have extended to the staff of the school.

All this has been a rather wonderful experience. There has been so very much hard work, so many exasperating moments, so many time-consuming details but I think that with our common goal, the development of the school - staff, students, and parents have formed an understanding and a bond which will exist over many, many years.

DEPUTY HEADMISTRESS

UNDERDALE HIGH SCHOOL COUNCIL REPORT 1968

The foundation Council has retired at the end of its three-year term. They leave behind them no spectacular achievements but many milestones, freely interspersed with disappointments, as is to be expected in the formative years of a project as big as the one we are engaged in.

A newcomer to the school looking at the rolling acres of weeds could be pardoned for asking what everyone has been doing since the ninth of August, 1965. Indeed, he may well form the opinion that the school has suffered from a singular lack of interest.

Nothing is further from the truth of course. The casual observer could not be expected to know of the continuous battle fought against officialdom that is necessary to get anything done, or of the frustration induced by drawn out negotiations and official discussions for improvements to the school grounds. In addition, we have the peculiar disadvantage of serving three Metropolitan Council areas, none of which wants any part of the expense involved in providing facilities for the children from their areas.

Now, if the reader should get the impression that this report is a criticism of the present system of providing playgrounds and other educational facilities in our Schools, he is quite correct.

It is high time that pressure was brought to bear on the politicians of this state to provide adequate facilities and funds on a loan basis sufficient to provide the amenities our children are entitled to. Why on earth should students, for at least the first five years, be deprived of the amenities and sporting opportunities available in established schools? Why should their parents be asked to provide funds and labour to provide these amenities for the benefit of future generations, when provision of a long term loan would ensure that these expenses be shared over a period of say 20 years?

The retiring High School Council established a foundation for the new Council to build on. The biggest and most expensive project of course, was the provision of tennis courts. The lawns now established were planted by voluntary labour to keep costs down, and all will agree that they have proved a real asset to the school.

Negotiations for the provision of ovals have at last borne fruit and work is in progress at present. Irrigation pipes have been laid, a bore and pump installed and at the time of writing, seeding is about to begin.

The Education Dept. has promised a Canteen building to be provided this year; this to be furnished by committee funds. It is hoped to have the canteen operating when school commences after Christmas.

It can be seen by this that the new High School Council will have plenty of work for the next three years in completing these projects and in maintaining them.

Our thanks go to Mr. Mueller and staff, the Parents and Friends, Canteen Committee and Ladies' Auxiliary for their help during the past year, and we look forward to 1969 with confidence.

Committee meetings have been conducted monthly and representatives of the Ladies' Auxiliary have attended, adding greatly to the efficiency of the committee.

The principal activity of the year was Gala Day in March, and approximately \$1,600 profit was realised as a result of months of planning and the support of parents and students on the actual day. This was our third Gala Day but, for various reasons, it has been decided to attempt something different in 1969.

A Mystery Car Drive was again organized on the June Holiday and an interesting drive concluded with an enjoyable afternoon at Uraidla Oval.

This function was followed by the half-yearly Association meeting which featured a demonstration of equipment by Mr. Klein of the Audio-Visual Education Centre of the Education Department. Later in the year, sixteen committee members visited the Centre's studio and viewed other teaching aids, including a reading machine.

Money raised by the Association is used solely for school needs and this year \$1,705 has been allocated as follows:

Tape Recorder for Speech and Hearing Classes, Open-air seating, library books, loop films, duplicating machine, craft equipment, cycle racks, lawn sprinkler, sporting goods, Prefects' pocket badges, wet weather clothing for Crossing Monitors, record player, practice cricket pitches.

In addition, \$800 has been granted to the High School Council to assist in the establishment of ovals.

Once again, the staff and students have been co-operative and helpful with our projects this year, and we thank them for their assistance.

Five Committee ladies represent the Ladies' Auxiliary on the Parents and Friends' Committee, and two of our ladies are on the Canteen Committee. The Committee ladies again served supper at the Welcome to Teachers night early in the year.

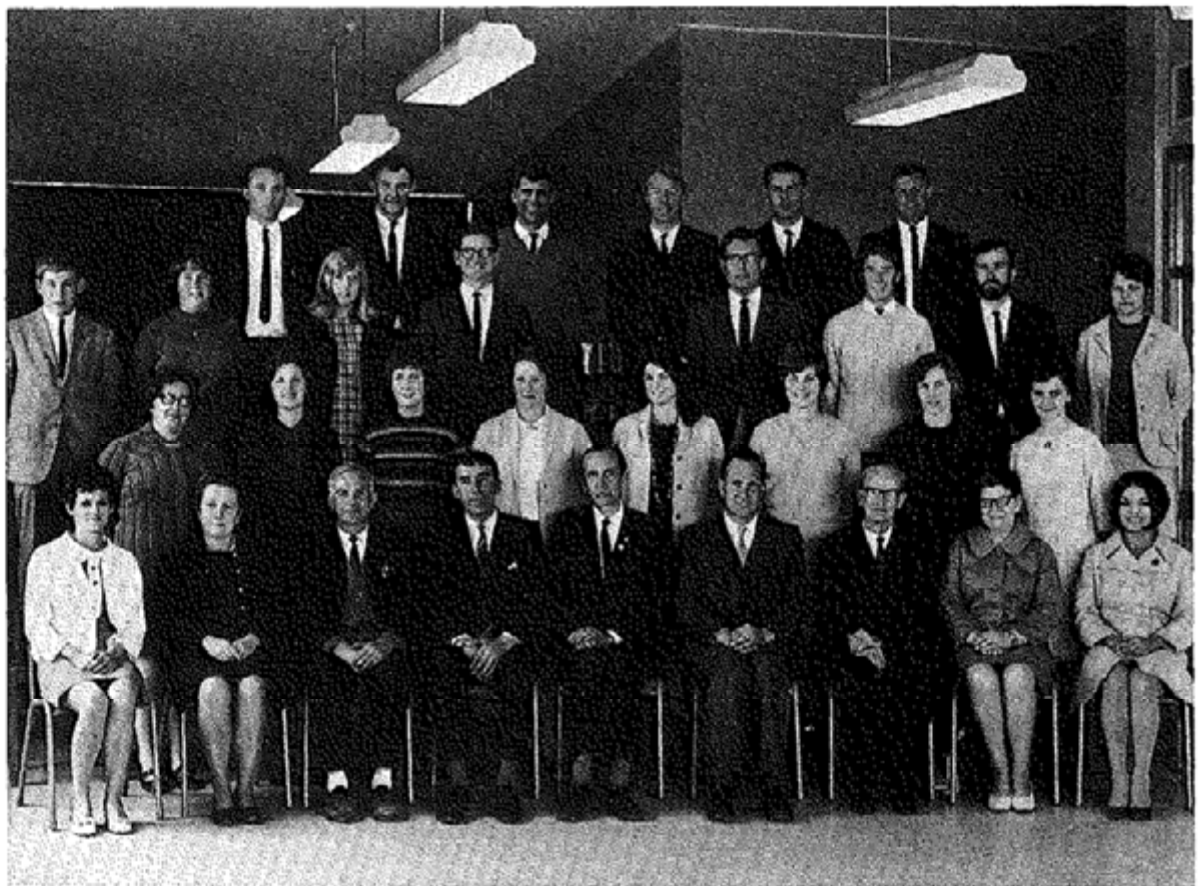

SPEECH AND HEARING NOTES

This has been an important year for the Speech and Hearing Centre and has seen the growth of the centre to its maximum - three classes and 25 students. This was the third year that the centre has been in the school, and for the first time the three class rooms have been used. Two of the rooms have been acoustically treated (carpet, loop induction and sound equipment, and sound baffles on the doors), and the third room has yet to be similarly treated. The plans for a separate speech room are at present in the hands of the architect, but no date for the actual completion of the work is known, and until such a room is provided, speech training has been conducted in a corner of the duplicating room. Under such conditions, it is not possible to conduct successful Auditory Training sessions.

The Centre has organized two camps during the year: one at the Tatachilla Lutheran Youth Camp near McLaren Vale on the weekend of July 19th to the 21st; the second, a longer camp at Toc H at Victor Harbor from December 4th to 8th. The success of these camps has been made possible by the help of the parents, some of whom joined the camp as supervisors and others who helped with transport.

Our thanks also go to the West Torrens Lions' Club, who once again have shown their practical interest in the Centre with a cheque for \$120. Some of this money has been used to subsidise the camps, and the balance set aside to complete the acoustic treatment of the class rooms by providing curtains, which will also effectively darken the rooms for the showing of pictures etc. The support of this group of public-minded men and their families over the last two years has been appreciated by staff and parents alike, and has helped in the provision of some of the 'other benefits' of education, so essential to the fuller development of our students.

Our thanks also go to the School Parents and Friends' Association, who have provided a tape recorder, for use in the speech room. This has been part of our 'essential equipment', and will continue to be the most used piece of equipment in the centre.

Geoff Woodlands has played football for the school, and Colin Harrison and Sydney Willmetts have been members of the school swimming team. Ian McMurtrie was a basketball representative and Beverley Elliott and Katrina Parker played in the Girls' tennis teams. As a result of special coaching, most of the students in the centre have learned to swim and play at least one other sport. During the year several of the students left to begin working. These were: Beverley Elliott (Housing Trust - filing clerk), Euodia Nicola (machinist), Colin Harrison (junior machinist/process worker), Garry Phillips (Building trade).

The staff have contributed much this year to the centre and the school generally by accepting responsibility in such activities as Boys' first aid, tennis and basketball coaching, supervision of Saturday morning sport, stamp and music (recorder) and travel clubs, boys' physical education, and general school duties and supervision. The staff has been:

Mr. B. Richardson as teacher-in-charge, and also responsible for the Speech training of secondary students, necessitating two days each week at the Croydon Centre.

Miss J. Perry as the first year class teacher

Mr. R. Rosser as the second year class teacher, and

Mr. J. Duffield as the third year class teacher.

Other staff in the school have helped in the centre with some of the subjects offered to the students. These were: Misses S. Potter and H. Mills, art; Messrs K. Young and A. Sanders, woodwork; Mrs J. Forrest and Mrs E. Harwood, typing; Mrs F. Carthew and Mr. D. Bottroff, physical education; Mrs J. Foggo, home science.

Next year we will be without two teachers (Miss Perry and Mr. Duffield) and the staff will be three teachers (two men and one woman). Plans have been made to conduct a research project into the reading development of Speech and Hearing Students, in co-operation with the Psychology Branch of the department, and it also hopes that some of the students from the centre will be able to join other classes in the school for some of their subjects, and thus provide further opportunities for greater integration within the school.

The final social for the year was held on the night of 11th December, and during the afternoon the centre was the host for the year-end meeting of all the staffs of Speech and Hearing Centres.

The interest and sympathetic help of the Headmaster, Mr. E. Mueller, and the two Deputy-Heads, Miss R. Wyatt and Mr. M. Thomas has played a most important part in the success of this year's work in the centre, and we look forward to the continuing relationship next year.

WHAT IT IS LIKE TO BE DEAF

My name is Philip Russell and I am fifteen years old. I am not very deaf but I wear a new kind of hearing aid. Before I came to this school I went to East Adelaide Primary School and I had trouble understanding the teachers. Sometimes they would talk too fast and sometimes they would be annoyed at me because I could not understand them properly. It wasn't my fault.

At Underdale High School I have no trouble understanding my Speech and Hearing teachers. I had Mr. Thurston for my first year and now I have Mr. Rosser, who is a very good teacher. All the teachers in the Speech and Hearing are good and they have all been very good to the classes.

I don't have much trouble shopping or talking to people because I have a voice, but the other deaf children might, because some of them have not got a good speaking voice. Some people have trouble talking to me because they have to repeat the same sentence twice or more. If I do not hear the second time they often give up talking to me. My parents often make me say the words properly and slowly because I sometimes talk too fast.

At school I have no trouble talking to the deaf children because they always lip-read me. Here some of the deaf finger-spell and that is too hard for me to understand.

I play football with St Peter's Football Club and I am Vice-Captain of East Adelaide Spicer Memorial. I enjoy playing sport with hearing boys.

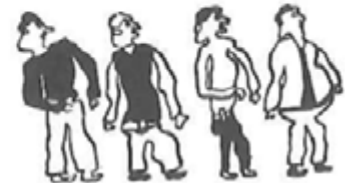
DEBATING

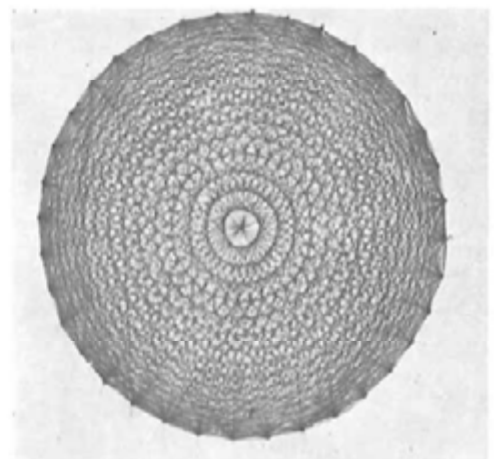

CHESSE REPORT

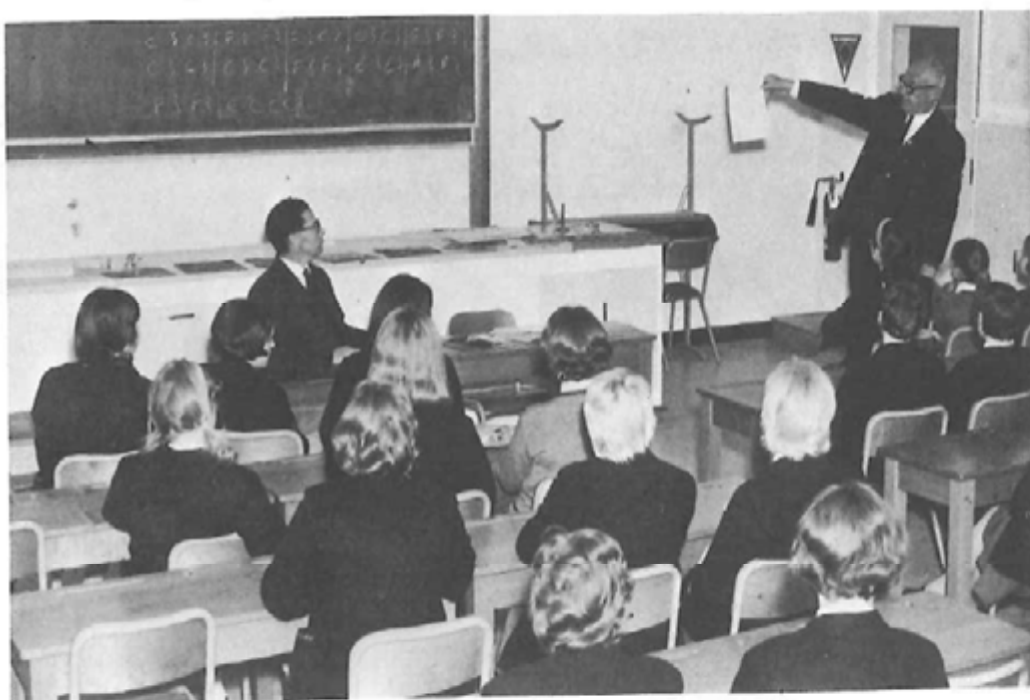
