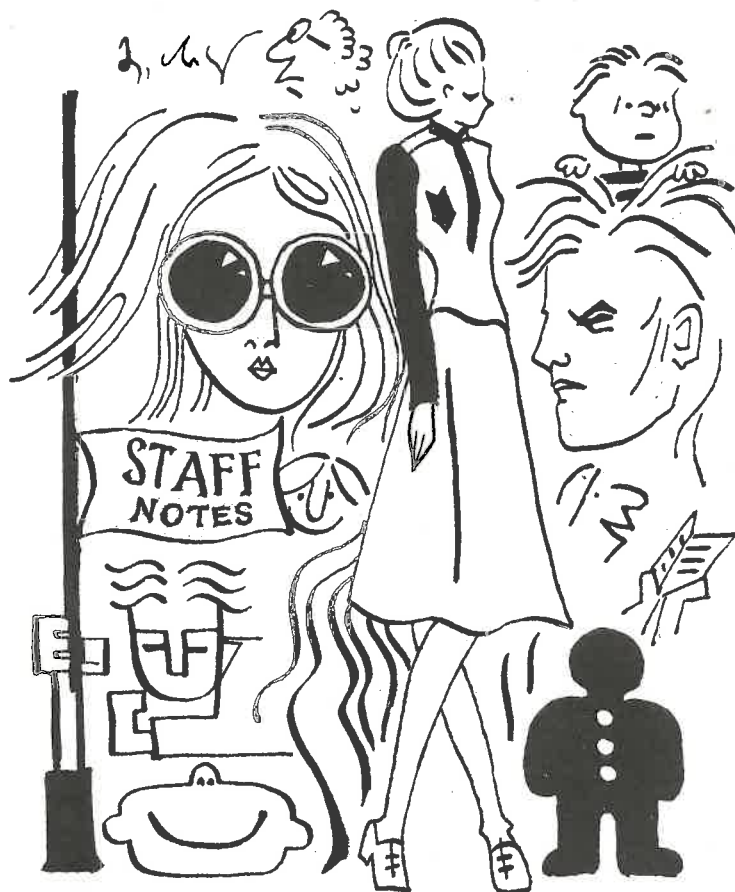

FROM THE HEADMASTER

Several weeks ago while I was watching tennis and cricket matches on the School oval, and, by the way, enjoying the sight, a young man whom I had never met introduced himself as an old scholar of Underdale High School. This brought home to me the fact that Underdale High School is now six years old; some quick research into the School's records later revealed that, at the end of this year, the School will have almost as many 'old' as present scholars. In this connection it is commendable that some of these old scholars have thought it desirable to form an Old Scholars Association — I trust that their early efforts will be rewarded by the support they receive from the growing number of old scholars in the years to come.

What changes have taken place during those six years since the School's establishment! My young friend commented on the tennis courts which had been completed only shortly before he left school and on the excellent ovals which were at that time being planned — and worked for — but which can now be used for such a variety of winter and summer sports. What a pity, I thought, that and old scholar appreciated these facilities while many of our present students take them for granted but do not make full use of them!

My friend sounded somewhat disappointed by the two wooden buildings and was, I felt, very surprised when I told him that they were a necessary evil. Once again, I thought, what a pity that so many of our students do not make the fullest use of the better facilities now being provided to develop their interests, and perhaps their hidden talents, in Art or to gain a greater knowledge of Music which plays such a great part in our lives.

There are many other improvements which have been made during the last six years which we did not discuss. I could have mentioned extra overhead and slide projectors and the Video-tape recorder, all of which are being used to make the study of certain topics more interesting and vivid. Perhaps the most important and far-reaching change has been the introduction of more interesting and meaningful courses and more lively teaching methods than were previously possible in the junior school. Those students who approach their life at School with interest and enthusiasm are certainly benefiting from these changes; unfortunately that cannot be said of all our students.

May I, in conclusion, take this opportunity to extend to you all the Compliments of the Season and Best Wishes for the future, whatever it may have in store for you, in the hope that what you have learned, and the attitudes you have developed at school, will help you to become whatever you are capable of being.

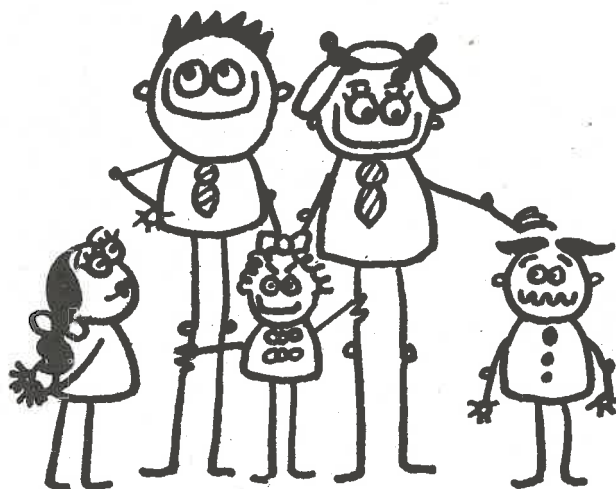

MY RAMBLE AFTER A YEAR'S RAMBLING IN AUSTRALIA

Has my mind been bent? Emphatically NO! I am what my thoughts are, and if they have changed, then so must I have. Perhaps they have, so if you are interested read on and find out why.

Imagine yourself in a situation such as I have been in for a year. You enter a foreign country that has differences in education, home life and habits, politics, social life, and many other differences, too many to mention. Your mind is open and I mean real wide open, prepared to listen to anything, look at anything, and read almost anything. You are like a dry sponge, ready and prepared to absorb whatever you find available. You meet strangers, thousands of them, and you build up friendly relations all the time, enter people's homes showing them your slides, and looking at theirs.

You meet people from all walks of life (even the humble old "wharfie") dine with the politicians or at the pie-cart and you chat and listen to each of them. Propaganda is of a different type as are the various mass media, and you find yourself subjected to new political influences and social pressures.

You find yourself at the conference table, discussing, debating, and listening to speeches on an inconceivable amount of different subjects. You pay official, social and unofficial visits to universities, schools, churches, factories, breweries, parliament houses, and steps and many other places of interest, and disinterest. Visits are made to other cities, towns, and country areas, one is continually on the move, meeting people from each and every walk of life.

Yes, I want you to imagine yourself in that position for a year, looking, listening, stopping to think, asking questions and telling your own story as I have done and enjoyed it for twelve months. Naturally one develops new ideas, opinions, philosophies, and you learn one almighty lot, even the rules of Australian football. As a result of this all, I have realised one's immeasurable capacity for learning, and feel that no university could ever have taught me so much so well in such a short time about so many things, and the beauty of it all is that I have enjoyed it so much.

Most important of all, has been the learning of people, human nature, what it is and what it does for us incredibly strange and interesting creatures and the way in which we respond to various influences. I have no doubt learned a great deal about Australia, its peoples and their way of life, habits and customs. Being in the position that I have, I have become aware of matters of international importance.

Technologically we are capable of seemingly impossible feats, landing men on the moon, for example; medical know-how enables people to live with someone else's heart in their chest cavity. We are advancing at such a fast rate that science of a decade ago is now suspect and often redundant. Yet, the tragedy of it all is that we cannot find a suitable formula for our critically sick world with its war, violence, political differences and social problems. It is strange, but yet so sadly true, that most of our problems lie where there are human relations, and need for understanding and tolerance.

Rotary International brought me to "Down Under" on its International Service Scheme of Student Exchange, to foster good relations between South Africa and Australia, and basically to assist our nations in having a better understanding of each other. I have learned a great deal about Australia and its people and I trust that some people have benefited from my presence by learning a little about South Africa, a great country.

Finally, thank you, AUSTRALIA, for a tremendous year in my life, and you can bet that there is nobody like a "fair dinkum Aussie" . . . that's what I think.

I belong to the Adult Deaf Club which is on South Terrace in Adelaide. I have been going there for many years.

Two years ago I joined the Adult Deaf 7-a-side Basketball team. The Victorian Adult Deaf Basketball team came to Adelaide to play against us. They beat us by about eight goals. Last year many young deaf girls joined us. We had two teams and we wanted to play against the Victorian Adult Deaf team again, but we couldn't because most of the young girls couldn't afford it. They wanted to save up for the Western Australia Adult Deaf Sport Federation this year. This year the teams were short of players so we only formed one team.

The Adult Deaf Club have had many socials and raised a large sum, because we need \$2,000 to pay the members of the sport teams' fares to Perth. We raised only \$1,000, so the deaf members had an idea. They chose four girls to be Queen of Men's Basketball, Table Tennis and Tennis, Cricket and Girls' Basketball. They raised over \$1,000, the Queen of Men's Basketball raised the largest sum and she was crowned Sports Queen. We were happy to have \$2,000. The Deaf members may be able to pay one-third of the motel costs and we will pay the rest.

On Thursday, October 22nd, four girls and I went to the Deaf Club to be chosen for Miss South Australia. There were about 10 people to judge us. Firstly we wore bathers and paraded in front of the judges. Then we changed into casual dress. One of the judges asked us a lot of general knowledge questions. The judges considered walking, figure, attractiveness and general knowledge. We all went outside for a while, and then back again to the judges. One of them asked us our name, address and age. We had to be able to talk on our fingers (fingerspelling). Later one of the judges said that I had been chosen Miss South Australia. In Perth there will be Miss Victoria, Miss New South Wales, Miss Queensland, Miss Tasmania, Miss Western Australia and me (Miss South Australia), to be chosen as MISS AUSTRALIA.

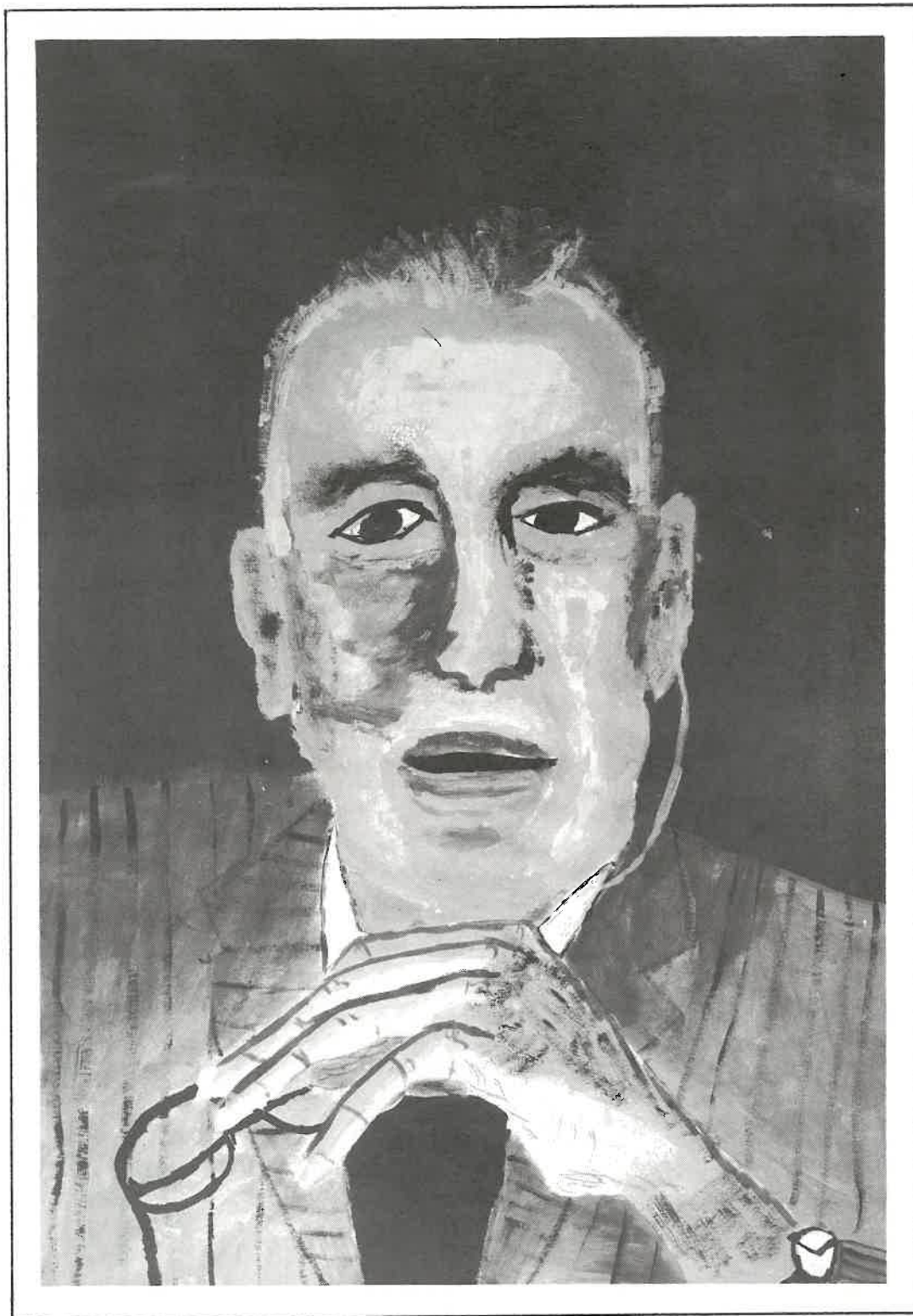

We are all hoping that South Australia will be winners in many events.

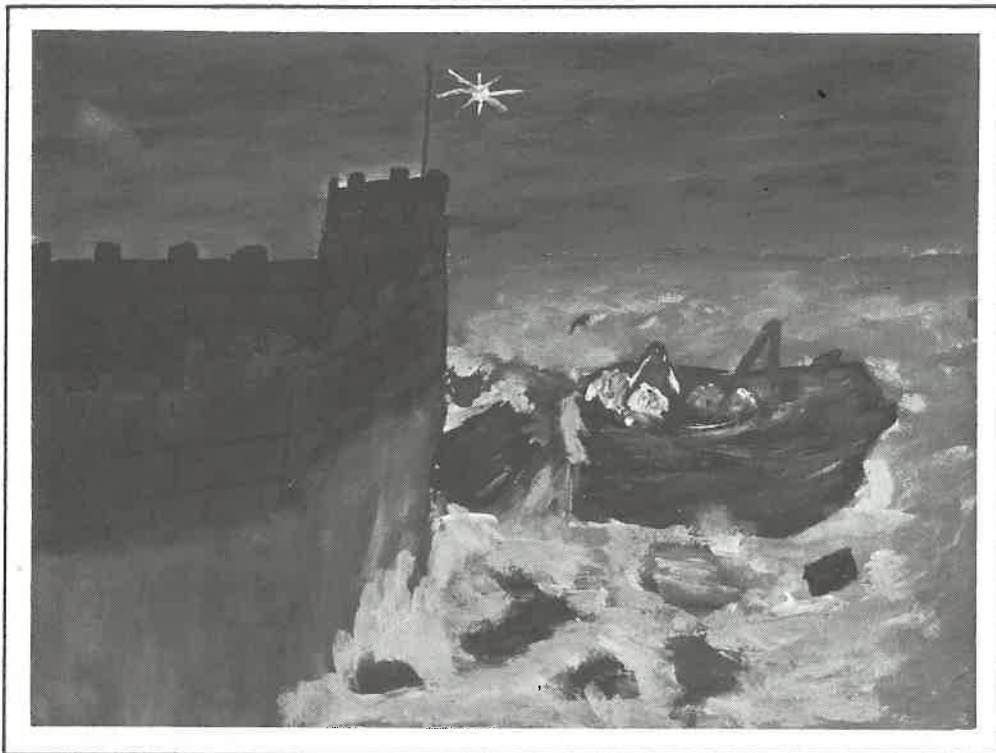

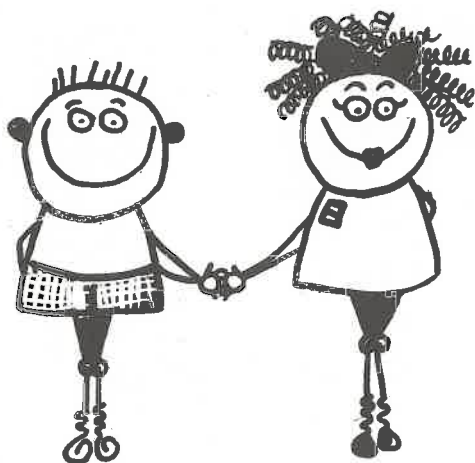
CROSS COUNTRY

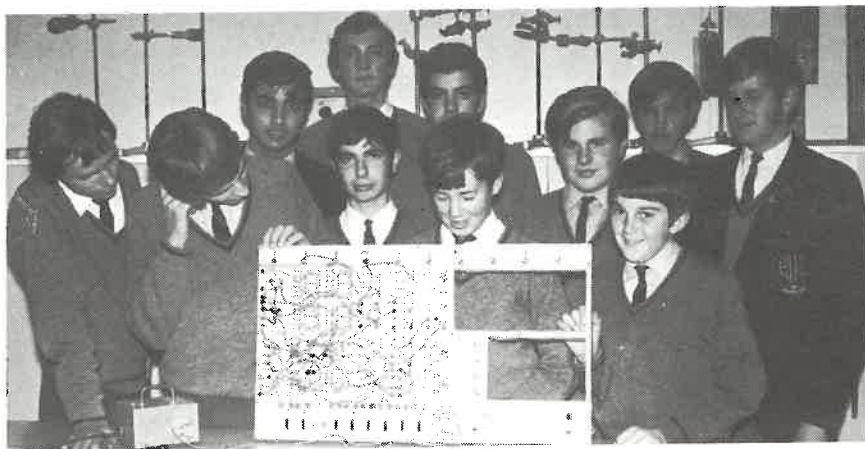

CYBERNETICS CLUB

Despite the ever-increasing use and importance of computers in commerce, defence and research, most people do not understand how these machines work. The purpose of the computer which has been constructed by members of the Cybernetics Club is to demonstrate the principles upon which more complex computers operate.

Modern computers have integrated circuits as their basic components. (These circuits are chips of silicon so small that they can fit inside the eye of an inch-long sewing needle, yet they can contain over one-hundred electronic components). We have taken a number of these circuits and mounted them so that electrical connections can be easily and quickly made and broken. Our computer also contains the necessary circuitry for feeding information in and displaying the results.

When using the computer, students connect the integrated circuits together to build a computer sub-assembly. When this assembly is completed, it is only capable of such tasks as adding six and seven, but by using our computer in this manner, students gain an understanding of how large computers work.

The club is indebted to Mr. Rigter, who founded it and teaches members the fundamentals of digital electronics; to Mr. Mount, for his technical advice; to Texas Instruments Co., for their donation of some expensive components; to Colin Clack and John Laslett, for their work on the computer last year and to Peter Simons for the large amount of time and effort he has put into construction of the computer this year.

THE GREAT UNWASHED

"The white man's Heaven," sings a Black Muslim minister, "is the black man's Hell!" One may object — possibly — that this puts the matter somewhat too simply, but the song is true, and has been true for as long as white men have ruled the world. They (Whitey) have had to believe for many years, and for innumerable reasons, that black men are inferior to white men. Many of them, indeed, know better, but, as you will discover, people find it very difficult to act on what they know.

From their birth, white men have been subconsciously brain-washed into believing their superiority. The Negro in America even bears the surname of the white Christian whose chattel his forefather was. But it is still the black man who remains trapped, disinherited, and despised, in nations that have kept him in bondage for centuries, still unable to recognise him as a human being.

The American Negro, and increasingly the Australian Aboriginal, have something that no other race really has: rage, hatred, and murder — hatred for white men so deep that it often turns against him and his own, and makes all love, all trust, all joy impossible. That man who is forced each day to snatch his manhood, his identity, out of the fire of human cruelty that rages to destroy it, knows, if he survives his effort, he will discover something about himself and human life that no school on earth — and, indeed, no church — can teach. He achieves his own authority, and that is unshakeable. This is what no white man will ever, or has ever, had.

"Here's the man who doesn't have any identity. But **tonight** he has the Los Angeles Police Department and the Los Angeles Fire Department. **upset**. He has the National Guard called out. Tonight he is somebody. Tonight he has an identity." Rev. G. Mansfield Collins, a Watts minister, speaking in the wake of the '65 riots.

Equality to what? To whom? Answer that please. Will you ever really try to understand Black Power, Black Men, or Black Feelings? Will you? At a time when blacks feel they are being further repressed, rather than liberated, they are turning inwards, trying to find a "soul", which White men cannot understand. But the trouble is, the white man cannot understand the negro because he cannot understand himself. Ignorance shuts its eyes and swears it sees.

Nigeria

In the first issue of "Satyr", an article discussing the Student Revolution stated "Any changes that are introduced will only succeed when truth is their basis." This is a fundamental concept of democracy, which is a form of government designed to protect the individuals in our own society and to avoid warfare with other societies being caused by our own.

... I therefore, contend that, although the "man in the street" should form an opinion on what his government does, the opinion of the public should not be able to cause the government to act against its better judgement. What is happening in Vietnam is an example of this very situation. Under the present circumstances the enemy cannot win a military victory. Thus the war has become a war of attrition, with Communist forces suffering huge casualties. Why do they keep fighting? Surely it is in the hope that public opinion in the United States will result in a premature withdrawal of that country's forces.

I am not saying that the public should complacently accept every act of the Government. Members of the public must form their own opinion for democracy to be able to work. In this way public opinion can guide the Government and keep it free from corruption. But we must not tolerate the situation where the government's decisions are overruled by public opinion, when most of the people do not know whether their opinion is right. For example, how many people know what terms for peace have been offered in the talks in Paris — surely an important consideration concerning our involvement in Vietnam.
