## THE PRINCIPAL REPORTS .....

Over the last decade social and economic changes in the community have resulted in schools facing new challenges. Many young people are staying at school longer with future tertiary study not being their ultimate goal. They are more motivated towards entry into a trade, the business world, and a diverse range of new careers spanned by the new technology. In response, schools have been forced to re-examine curricula and initiate courses which are a more relevant preparation for new career opportunities and likely life-styles, including more leisure time because of forced unemployment.

Young people are maturing at an earlier age and they are greatly influenced by the 'models' they see on T.V. and in advertising through the media. Self-discipline in study habits, which underpins successful academic study, has been eroded by short-term goals and low concentration spans of some students.

Against the backdrop of these social and economic changes, it has become necessary to re-evaluate the purposes of our schools. What are they trying to achieve for our children?

Let me emphasize at the outset that I believe the fundamental goals of yesterday are still the cornerstones of the curriculum of today's comprehensive secondary school. What are these goals?

Firstly, I believe we should emphasize the basic academic curriculum. Our prime focus must be the teaching of language skills, the methods of calculating and manipulating numbers, exploring the disciplines of Science and Technology, and informing the young about their heritage and the world in which they live.

Secondly, I believe the school should be an orderly place. Aims should be clearly defined and high standards expected. The school atmosphere should be warm, spirited and friendly, with students exercising self-discipline and responsibility for learning.

Thirdly, we should have an unflagging commitment to excellence. We should all constantly motivate ourselves to produce our best work and strive to achieve at a level which is excellent by any standard.

Fourthly, we should have high expectations of ourselves and everyone. As teachers and parents we should expect all students to work hard and allow them to earn the kind of self-respect and achievement which follows from sustained effort.

Finally, we must inculcate in our young people the values and attitudes on which our society is based. Courtesy, good manners, pride in dress and appearance, good speech, honesty and respect for others are just a few of the fundamental values to be passed on to the young.

In order to make a good school, these are the goals for which teachers, students and parents must strive. I hope you also share these views so that we can all continually strive to make Underdale High School a school of excellence.

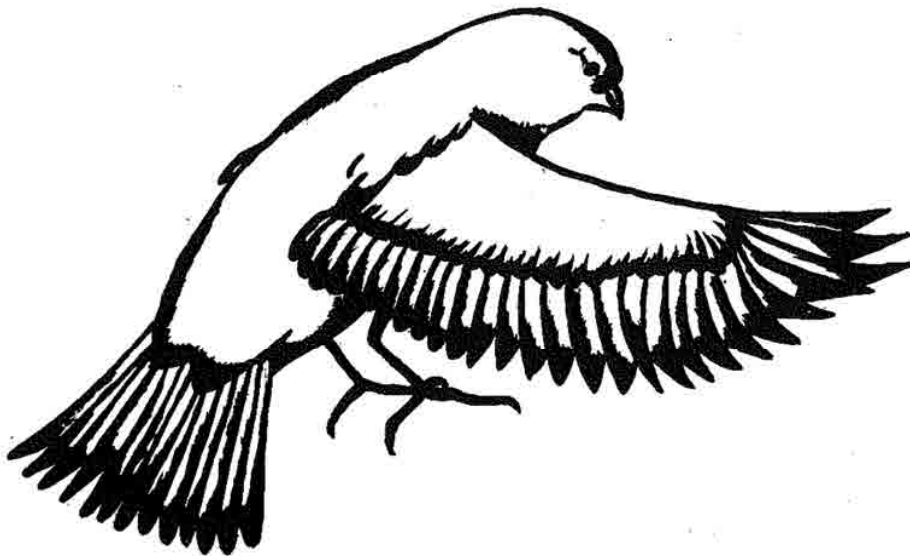

The club members visited the Phoenix Society where we saw the machine bought with the \$1 050 raised through Underdale High School's "Walkathon".

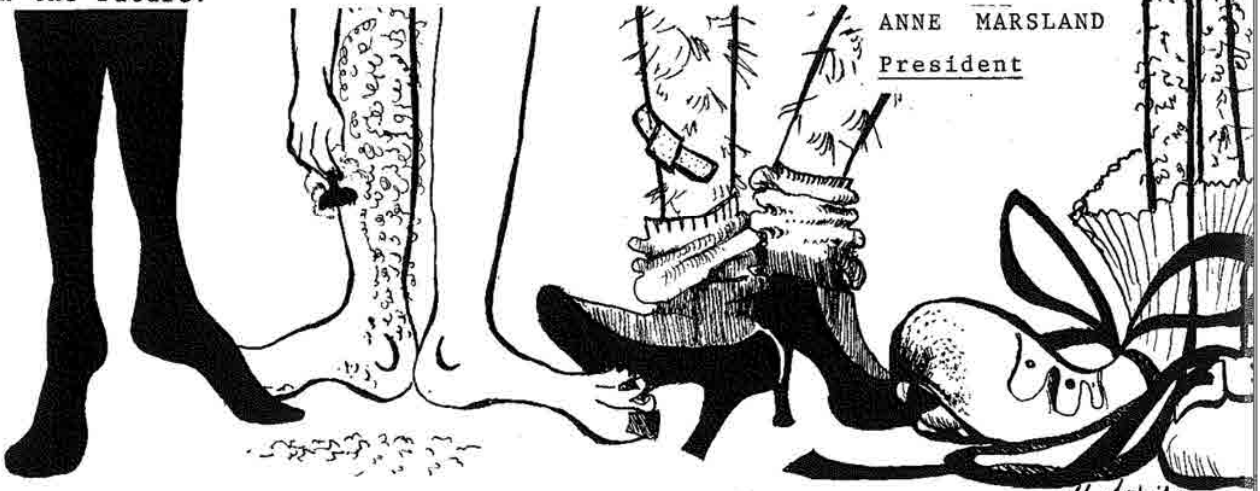

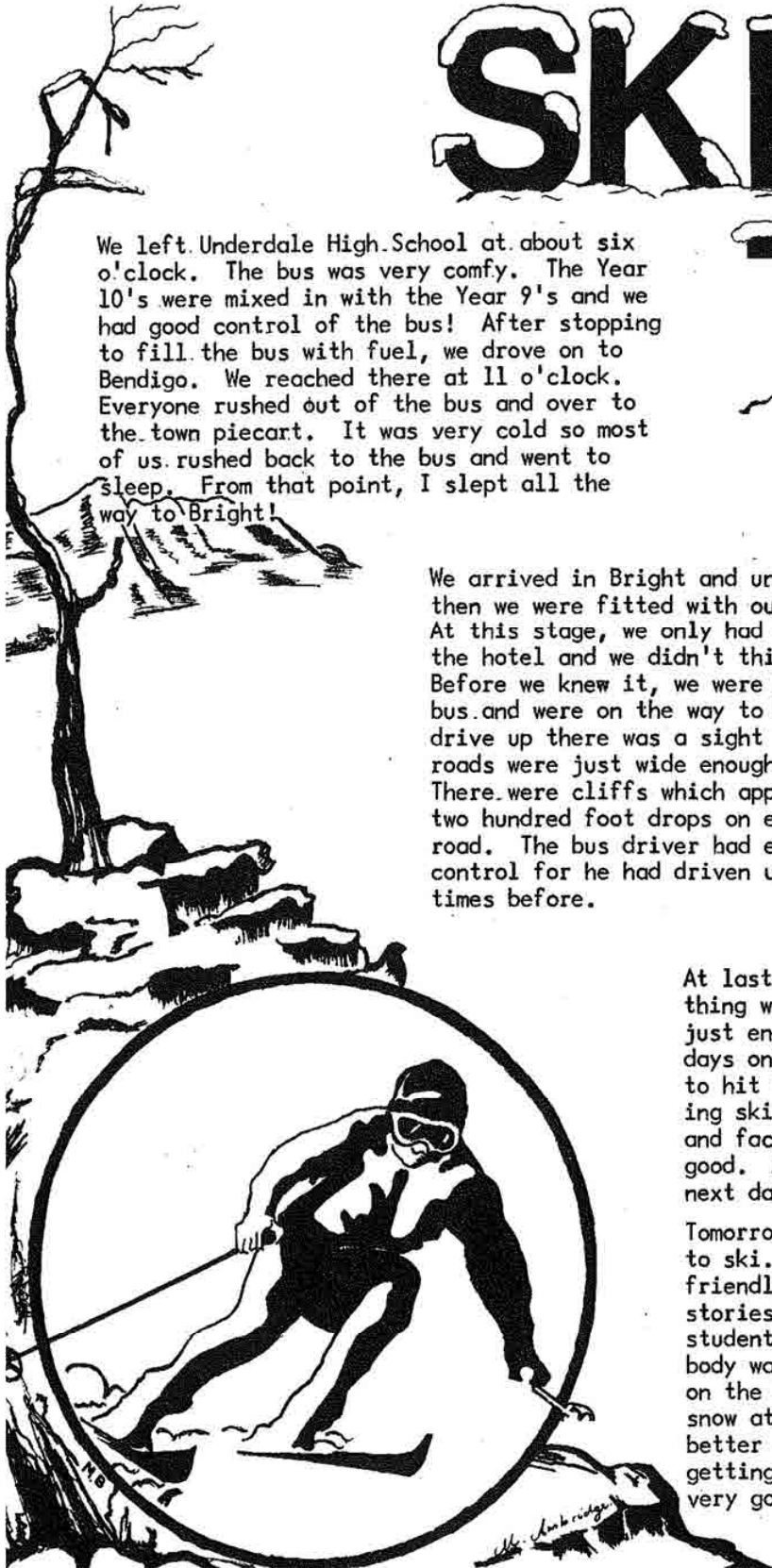
# TRIP


The Underdale High School snow trip was really something to remember and something no-one will forget in a hurry.

# MOTOR MAINTENANCE

## THE UNDERDALE AUTOMOTIVE WORKSHOP.

In 1982 at 4th year level, 3 automotive programmes are available, an elective unit of 12 weeks duration; an intensive trade unit comprising 9 lessons per week for 1 year; and the Transitional Education programme.

The intensive trade programme is designed to develop a variety of skills that are of value when applying for automotive trade apprenticeships. A theoretical and practical approach is combined in the overall training programmes during the year. The construction and development of operating sectioned automotive models prove to be challenging, interesting as well as hard work. This years intensive group has been responsible for producing a completely sectioned 161 Holden Engine, a rear axle assembly, and a 3 speed synchromesh gear box. Blood, sweat, tears, frustration, cursing and teacher harassment were all responsible for high quality models.

At Underdale High we have those students who picture themselves with the following romantic image. A grease-smeared face, dropped in an oil stained shirt, wearing grease coated overalls, and marching 2 abreast with spanners as their weaponry. At some stage they have stood holding one piston in one hand, a hammer in the other, and a burning desire in their brain "where do I put it"? These are the students who elect to do the 12 week elective which is designed to introduce, familiarize, and teach maintenance skills involved with handling of certain selected automotive components.

The Transitional Programme is designed to increase students automotive knowledge and develop maintenance skills.

# My Work Experience

I feel that work experience is a very important part of the senior high school programme. Most pupils at this time are unsure of the work they would like to do in later life. The work experience programme gives these students an opportunity to see for themselves what the working world is really like. The type of work the student might do varies greatly from trade to trade, and other areas of work.

The time that they would spend with the company or firm would give the pupil an idea whether they would like the work or dislike it. If they enjoy the work, they can follow up a career in that area, or, if they find that they do not like the work, they know not to waste time searching for work in that specific field. The work experience programme is also good for the employer; he can observe what the person is like, how he works and if the work is done efficiently. Thus he can employ, or get a much better idea of that person's capability to work.

During the week 19-23 July I had the opportunity to work with a small plumbing company D H Knight & Sons. Work in this trade I feel is very good because the money is good, and the work is interesting. When the details were finalised and I knew that I would be going to work with the company, I only had a vague idea of the work I would be doing. I thought this would be digging trenches, laying new pipes, clearing drains, and connecting up the water mains to new houses. I found this to be right but there were a few other jobs that I had never thought a plumber would do.

On the Monday morning I arrived at the home base of the company, slightly nervous but ready to fulfil anything which would be asked of me. The two owners of the company, Graham and Phil Knight, were really good blokes, and the single apprentice seemed good too. For the first three days, I worked with Graham and the final two days, I worked with Phil.

On the first day, we went to an old house to do some guttering. This was one job I didn't expect a plumber to do. On this job, which went for most of the day, I learnt special techniques for putting up gutters, the names of items used for guttering and the tools used to put it up. I also observed the method by which corners are made and ends are sealed off. While on this job, I learnt the way in which the angle of the gutter is made to obtain maximum run-off without making the place look ugly.

In the later part of the afternoon, we went to two more jobs where we were to unclog drains. This is done with a choke machine. The choke machine is worth about \$1000.00 and is quite large; in fact, a special trailer is needed to haul it around. The machine consists of a large cable and an electric motor. The motor winds the cable through the drain clearing all debris.

During the next two days, we unchoked more drains, fitted new connections in bathrooms, replaced thermostats, did some tiling in a house and some cementing. These were a couple of more jobs I didn't expect to do.

On Day Four and Five, I was working with Phil Knight whom I really enjoyed working with. In these couple of days, we laid new pipe and replaced down pipe, did some more cementing, replaced more guttering and repaired broken pipes. While working with Phil, I discovered a few more jobs I did not expect a plumber to do.

I enjoyed immensely my week with D H Knight & Sons as the work was different and interesting, and the bosses were great. I suggest to any other people doing work experience to behave accordingly, be polite, show respect and remember, good work in minimum time is required. It paid off for me; I've been asked to work for them again in the September holidays and have the chance of being offered an apprenticeship.

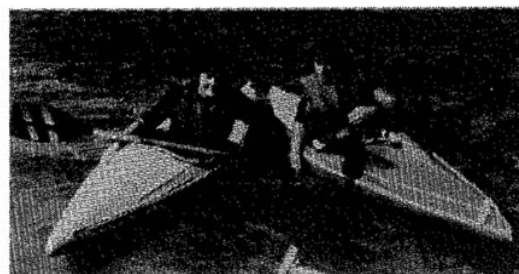

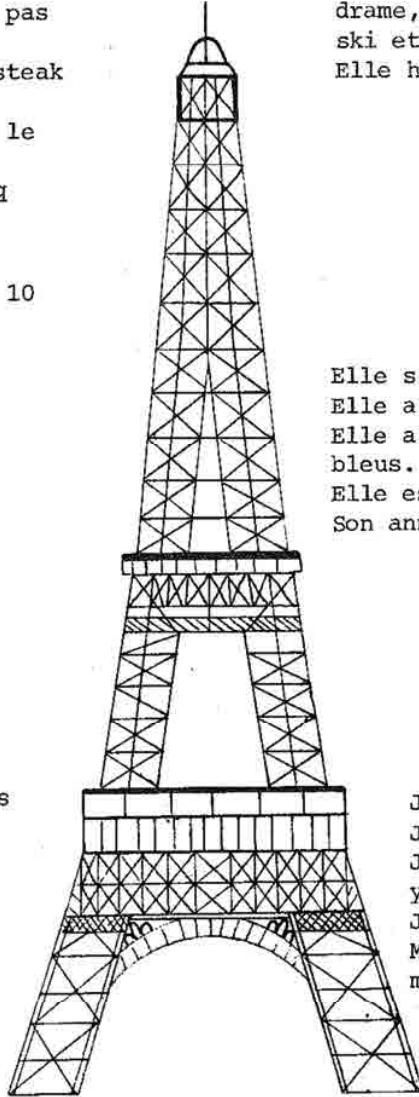

Mr Morley came near the end of the lesson and congratulated us on a fine turn-out. We then put the chairs and tables back to their original places before going to lunch.

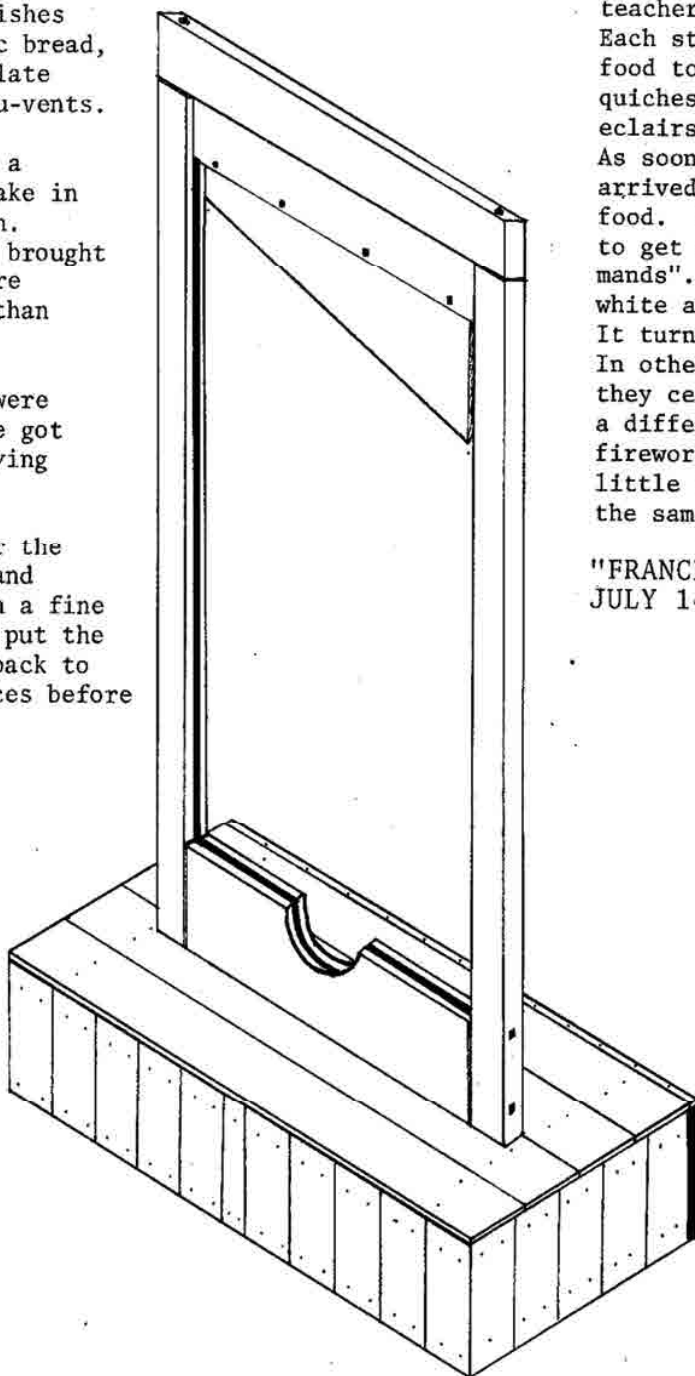

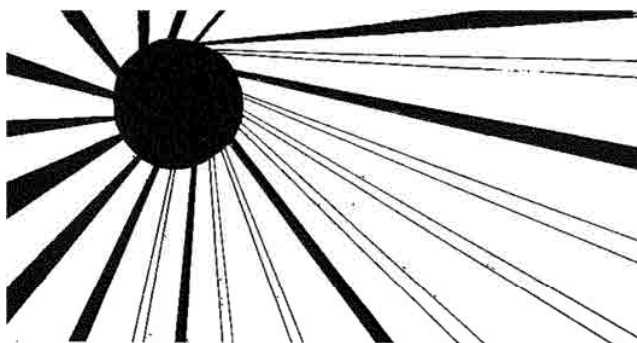


The day was fine when we started out,

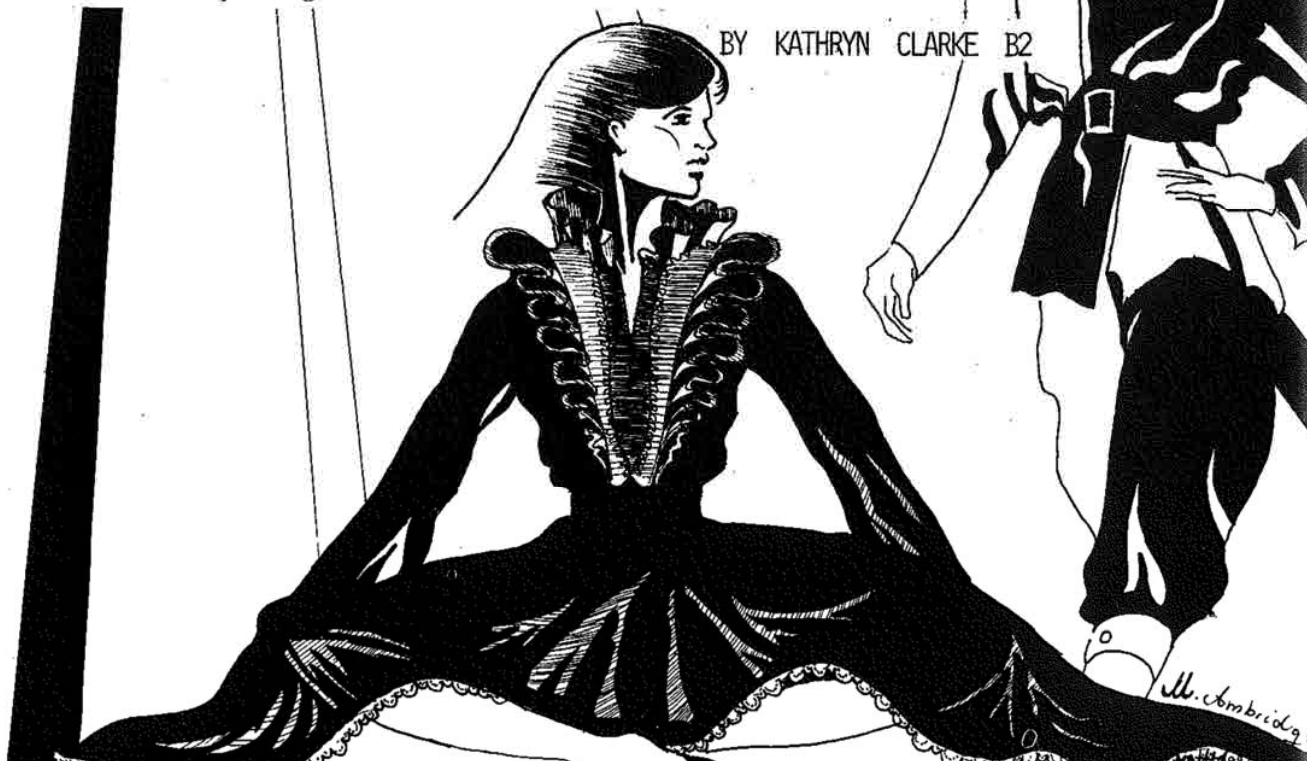

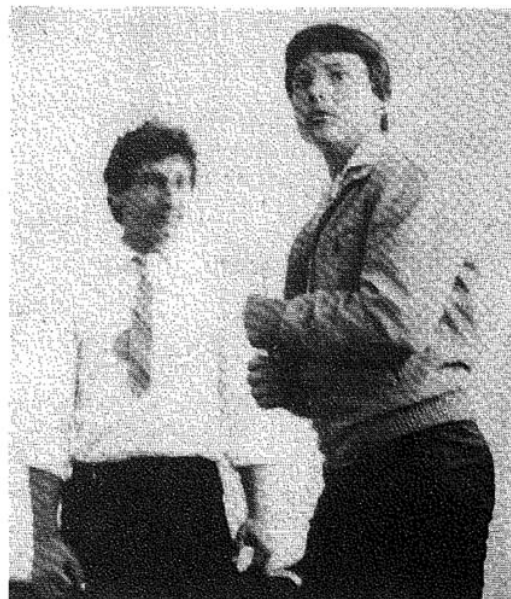
The colours were of every kind. There were bold red and black shirts with startling skirts. Some of the combinations were a little over dressy.

On a more serious note, two students, J Pakos and A Pipinias, played for the staff team. They were the only two who played!

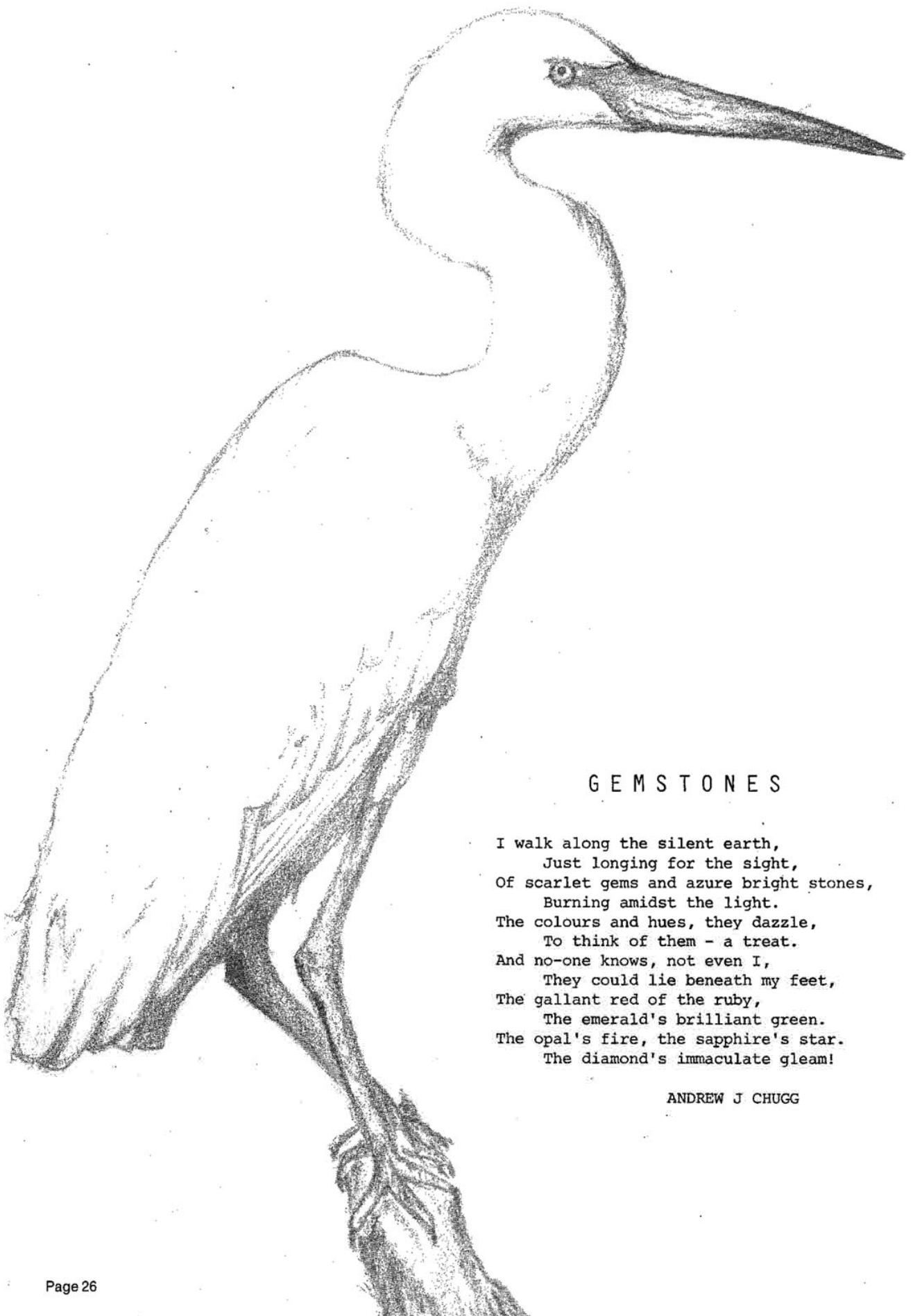

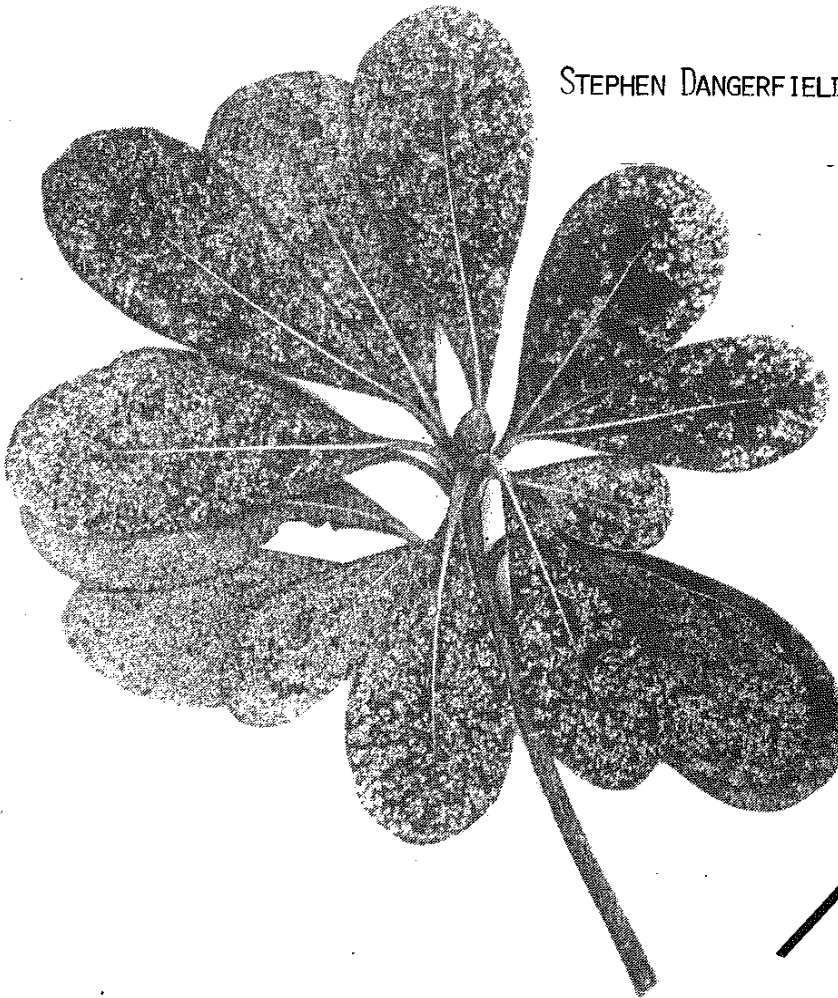

The next game was against West Lakes who weren't a very strong side, and this looked to be our first victory. Which it was and we won fairly convincingly.

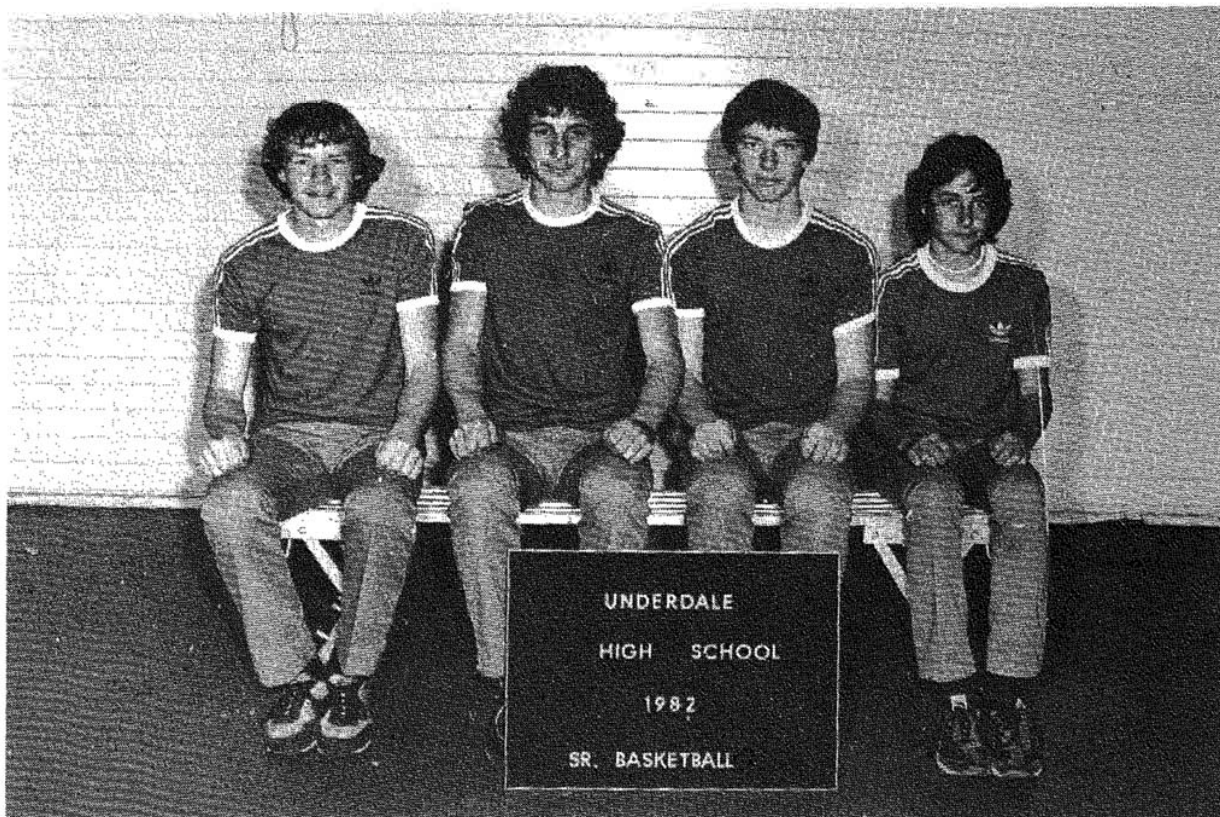
We were to front up against the Parks the next week and we were again confident we could make it two-in-a-row.

The medals that were given did not mean that it was only these two players who performed well. It was a team effort that provided us with our three wins.

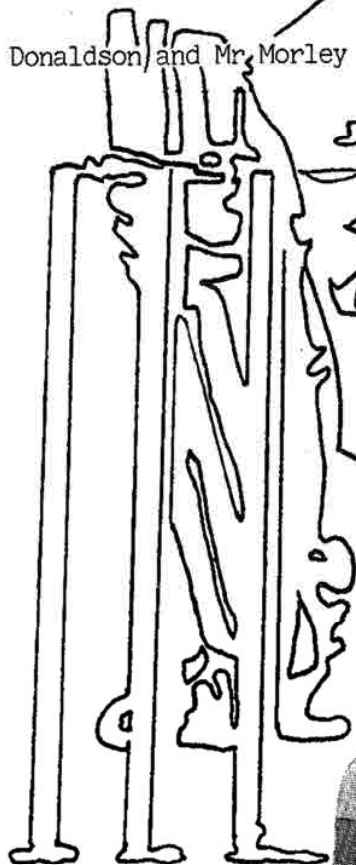
