### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Schools are increasingly being expected to achieve a multitude of educational goals with young people. While most of these goals are individually worthwhile, it is necessary, periodically, to stand back and re-assess our purposes and directions. For unless we take this critical stance we are in serious danger of our fundamental goals being diluted and diffused.

I believe that we must continually remind ourselves that our educational mission is, in essence, twofold.

Our first priority is to provide an ethos for learning where students achieve high standards in the basic skills of literacy and numeracy. These skills then provide the foundation for the intellectual development of young people through the rigorous academic study of the important areas of knowledge in the latter years of schooling and for the rest of their lives. Secondly, and equally important, schools must provide opportunities for the personal growth and social development of its students. It is therefore essential that we have a vigorous co-curricular programme of sports, clubs and societies which runs parallel to the formal classroom programme.

I believe we are achieving these twin goals at Underdale High School. Excellent academic results at Year 12 level, including both 'P' and 'S' subjects and some fine achievements in the extra-curricular programmes verify this assertion. Outstanding achievements included a very successful School Production for the fourth consecutive year; winning the S. A. Senior Girls Tennis Competition, the Inter-Zone Netball Competition, and the S.A. Under 14 Girls' Basketball Competition. Other teams, including Cricket, Tennis and Netball teams also won premierships. We are also very proud of our Small Business Management Group which won the inaugural "Youth Business Award" given by the Small Business Corporation of S.A.

I am proud to report these achievements of our students and pay tribute to the unselfish commitments and efforts of their teachers.

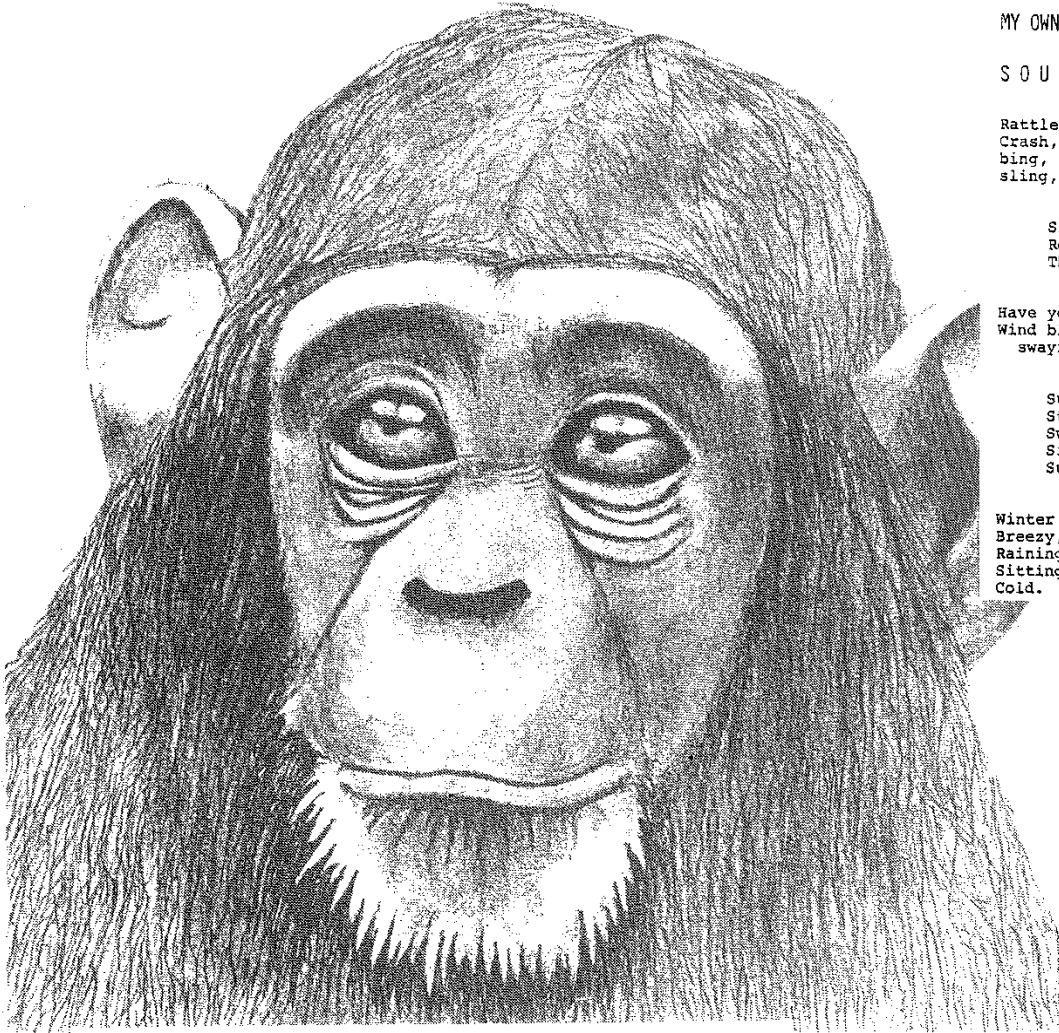

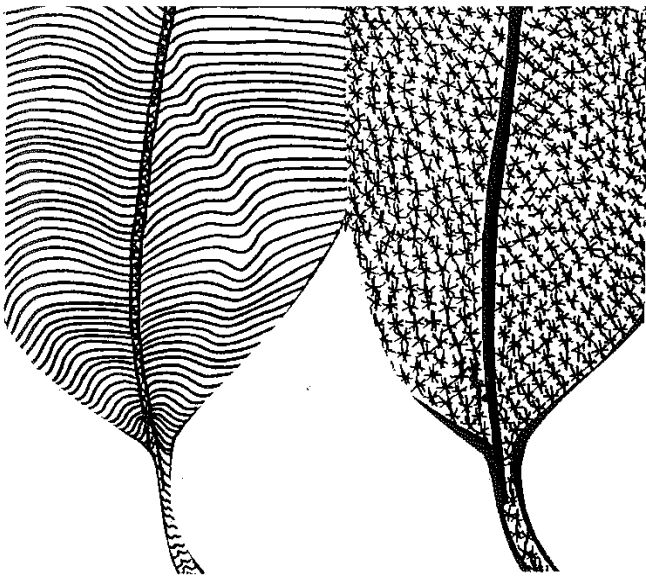
POEMS OF THE SENSES by Harlan Marks

## BUSHWALKING CAMP

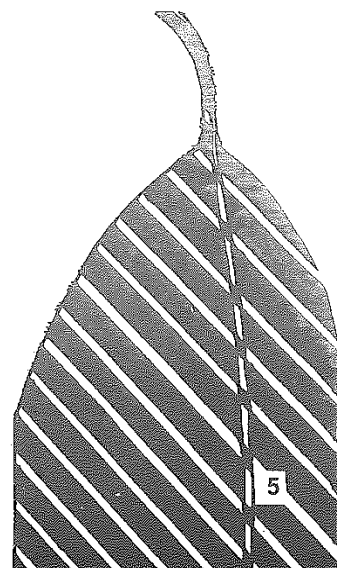

## THE VIETNAMESE NEW YEAR FESTIVAL

New Year is the most important festival in the Vietnamese year. The Vietnamese usually celebrate the New Year on 1st January according to the lunar calendar, which occurs in spring time, and for this reason, the festival is also known as the Spring festival.

Two weeks before the New Year the people are busy preparing for the celebration. Everything in the house is tidied up, walls are repainted and windows must be free from dust and stains. The family tombstones are also cleaned. In South Vietnam people who have got a spring tree in front of their house, have to take all the leaves off so that the tree will blossom when the New Year comes.

A week before the New Year, every family has to make an offering of sweets, fruits and flowers to the kitchen god, who is believed to live in every home, and visits heaven to report on the behaviour of the family during the previous year.

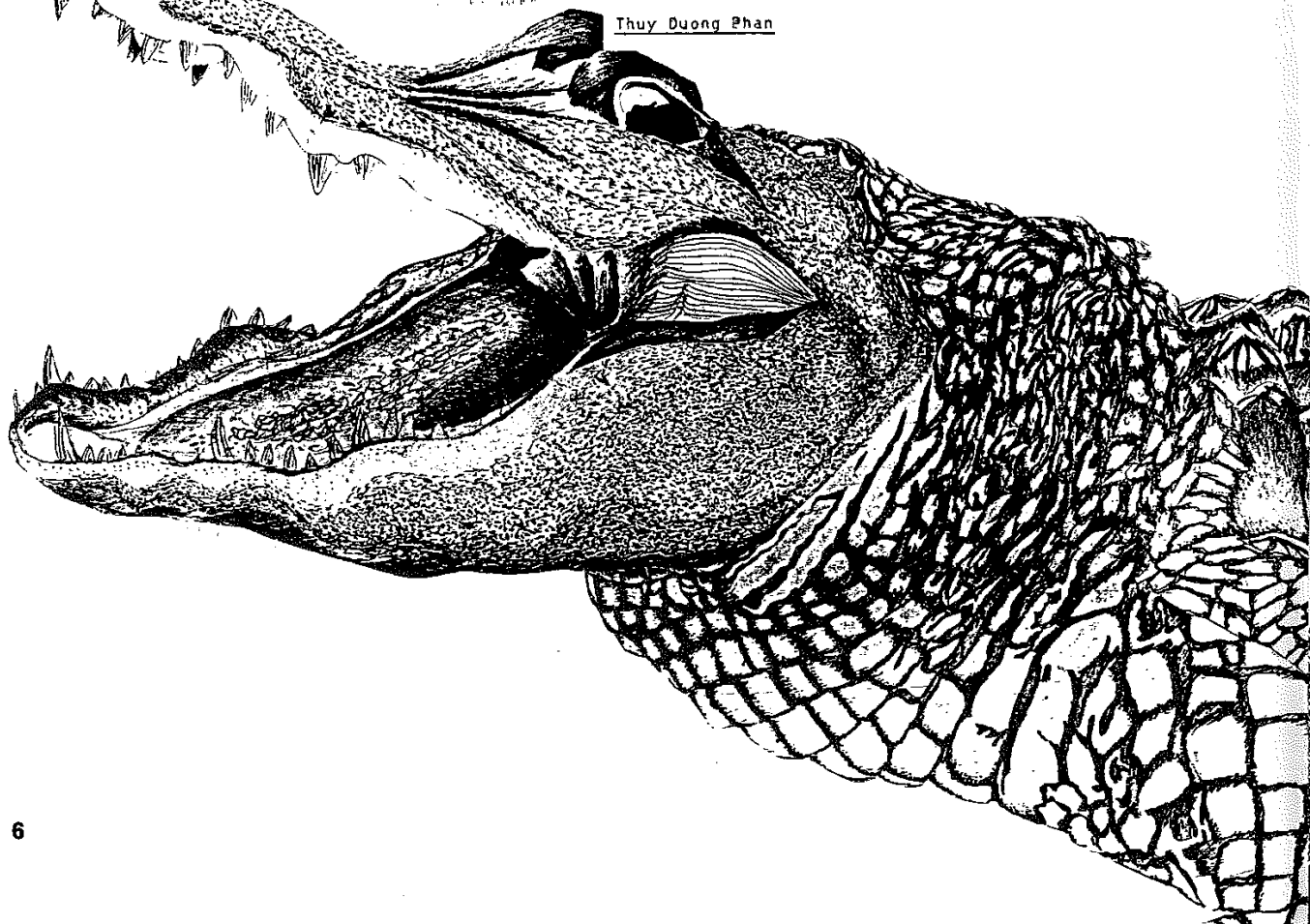
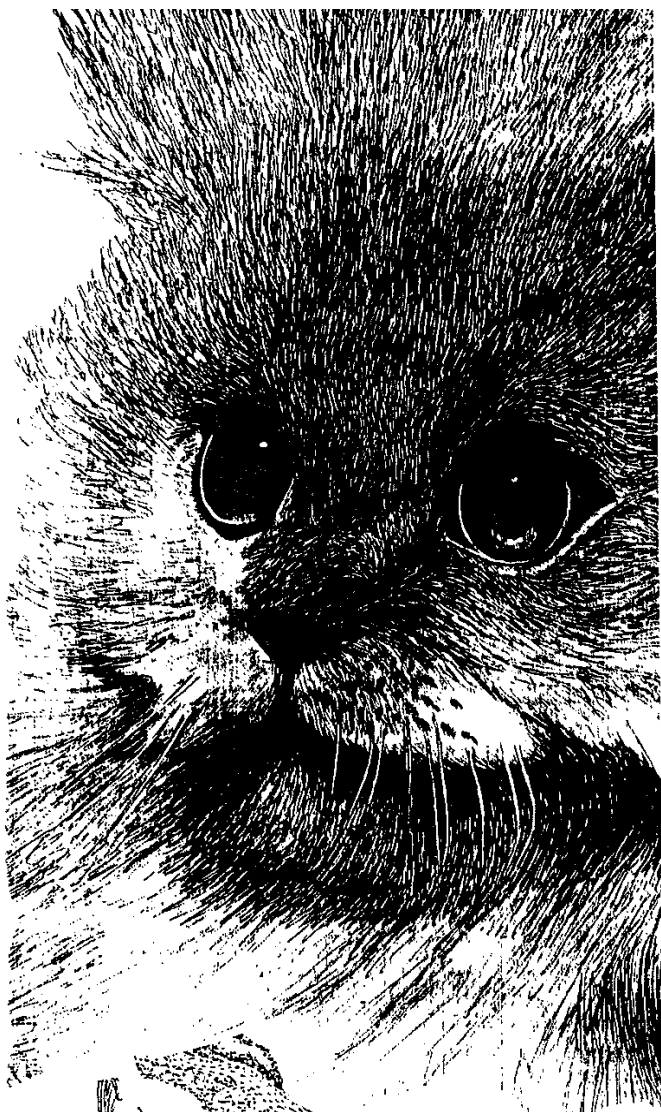
The Vietnamese New Year begins at midnight on New Year's Eve. At that time, fireworks and fire crackers go up and can be heard everywhere. People usually wait up for this moment and then they exchange New Year greetings. The Northerners share the belief of the Scots that the characteristic of the first person to come through the door of their home in the New Year will reflect that family's fortune for the whole year. So they usually arrange in advance for that person to be someone who is associated with good luck and prosperity.

Jams, watermelons, many other food and fruits and a special cake made up of meats, green peas and some other things and coated with sticky rice can not be left out of the New Year festival.

On the first day of the New Year, Vietnamese children are given new clothes. They wish a Happy New Year to the old people in their family and are given coins wrapped in red paper. Most people go to visit the pagodas on that day to pray for luck for their family and for themselves. People usually play cards and many other games on New Year's Day. They are also very careful in their behaviour on this day, believing that it will set the pattern of family life for the coming year. They try to avoid punishing children, breaking dishes, lying or saying unkind things. On the second and third day people go to visit their parents, their relatives, their teachers and their friends.

In the past, the New Year festival used to go on for fifteen days but nowadays, the festival only lasts for three days. After that, the people have to go to work and the children have to go back to school. However, the days and months pass very quickly and another New Year soon comes.

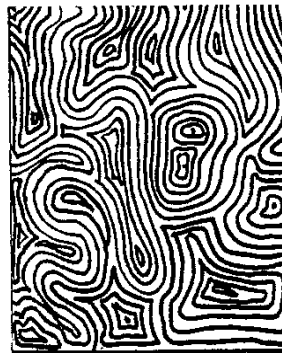
### BASKETBALL

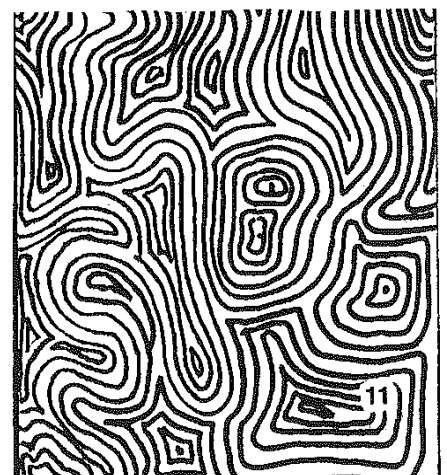

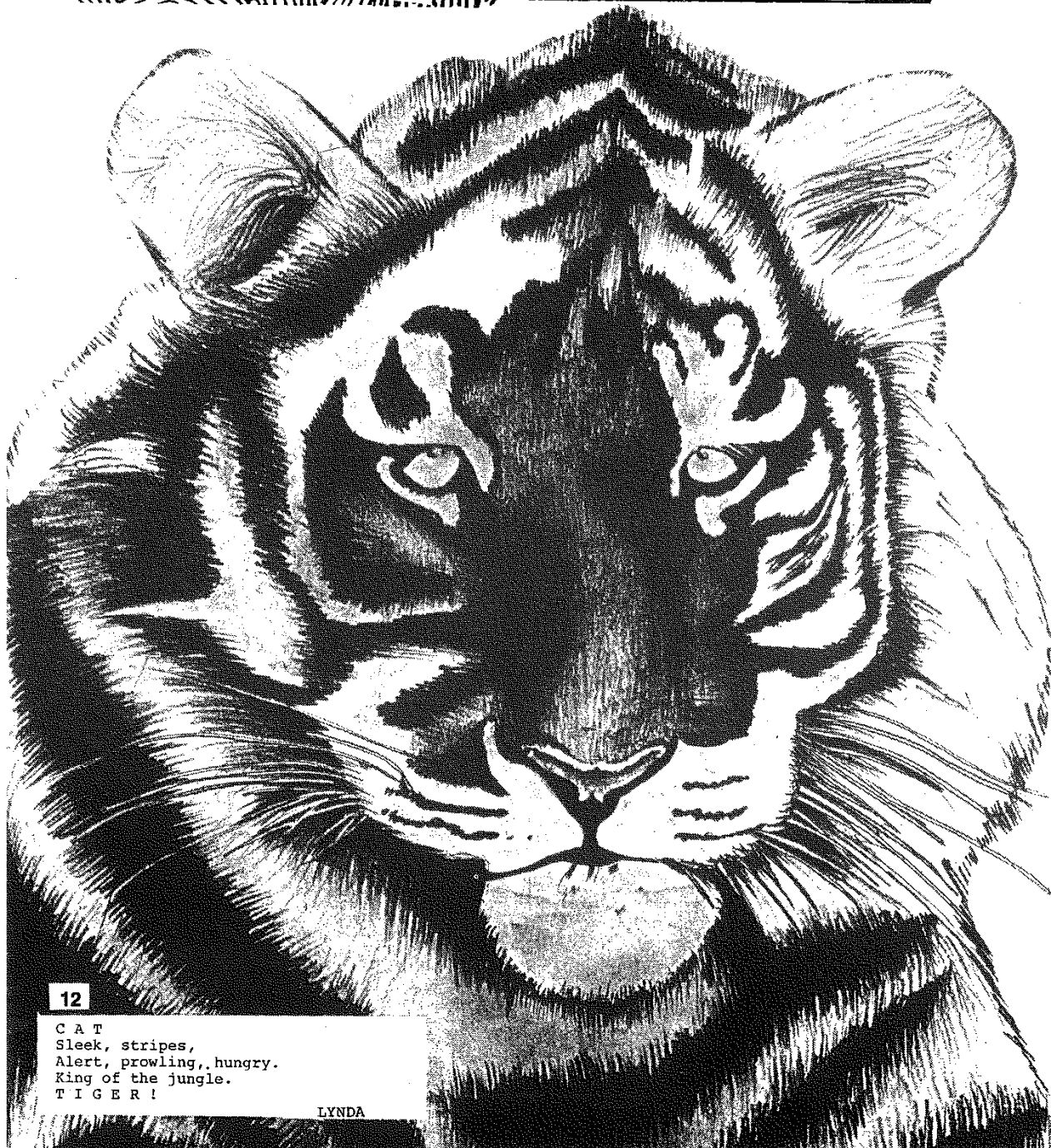

"Well done, Gabby" muttered Kenith. "You're the first to have beaten me!"

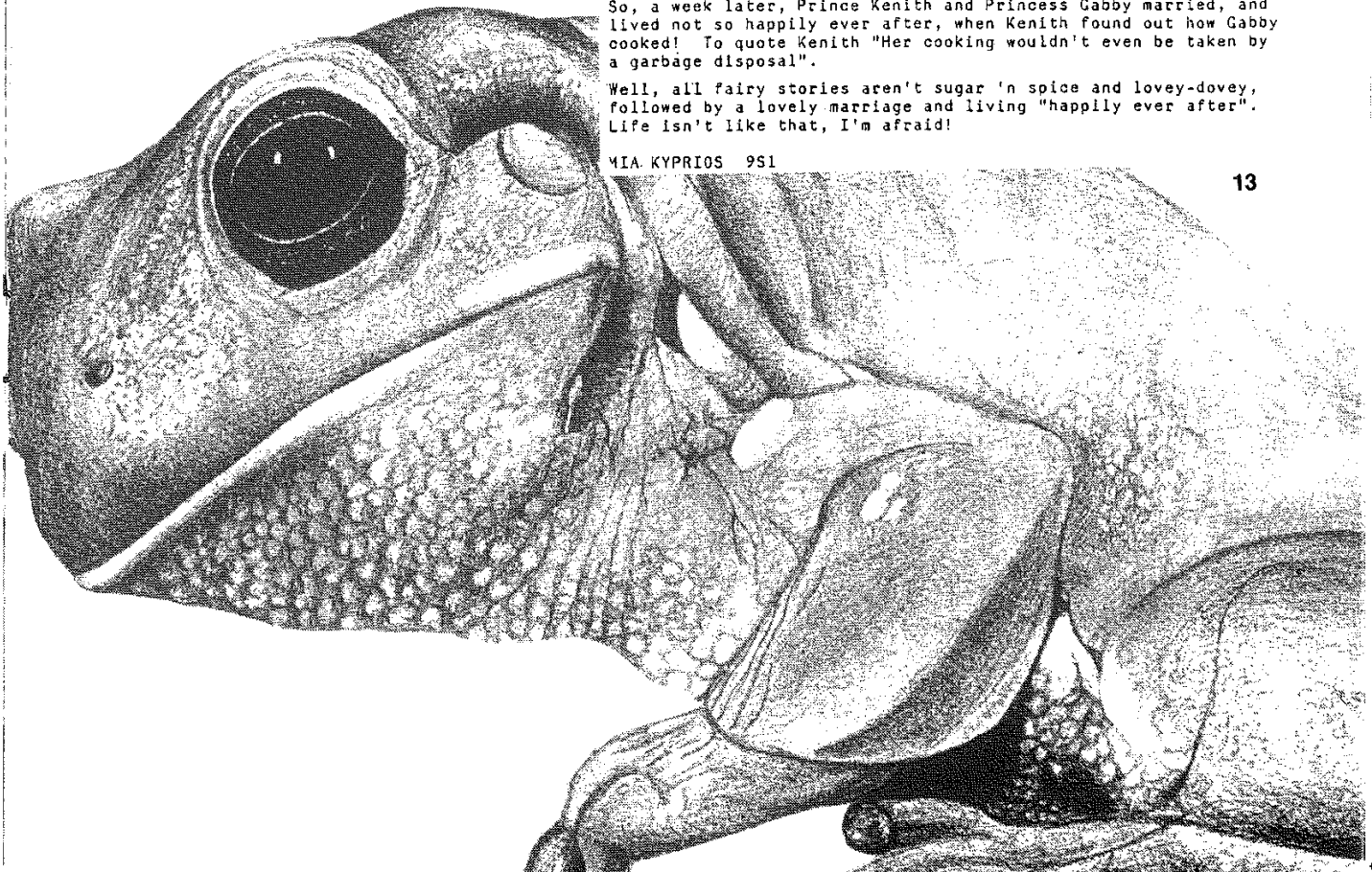

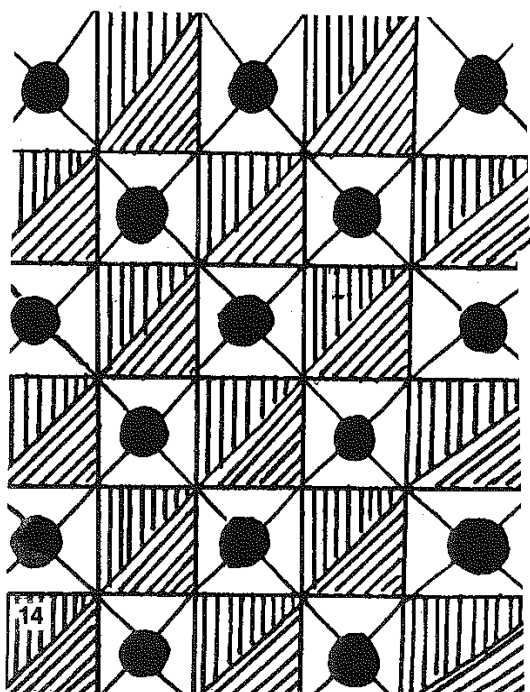
### U/13 BOYS TENNIS

This year's 'A' Grade Netball team has continued in the fine tradition laid down by previous Underdale High School teams.

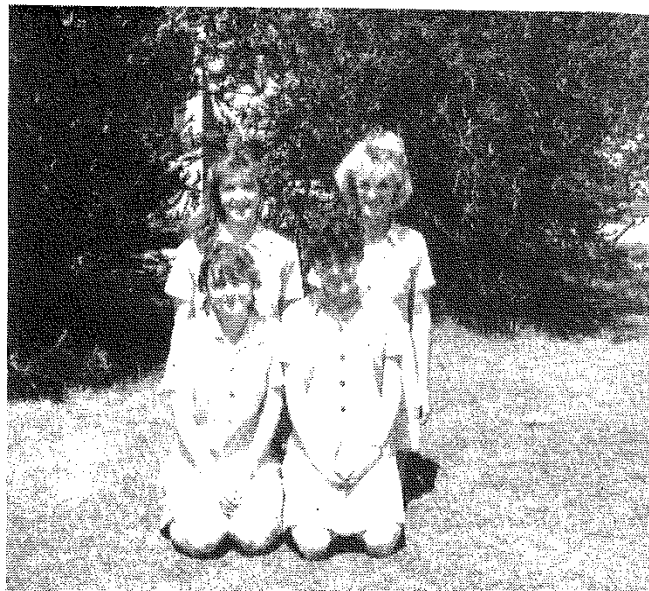

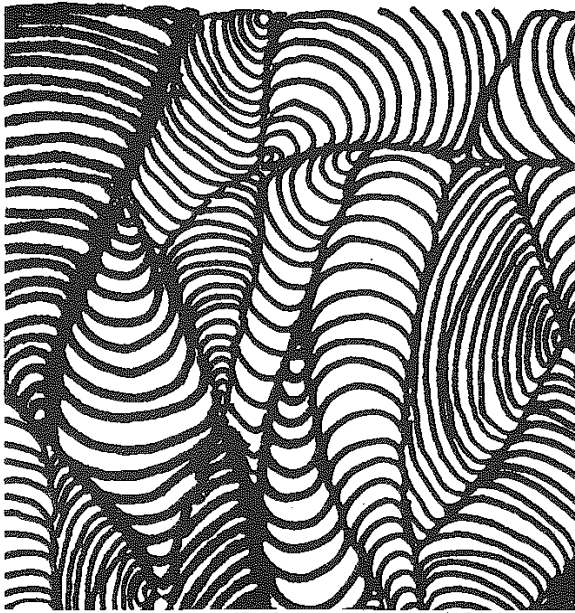

#### JUNIOR GIRLS BASKETBALL (U14) REPORT

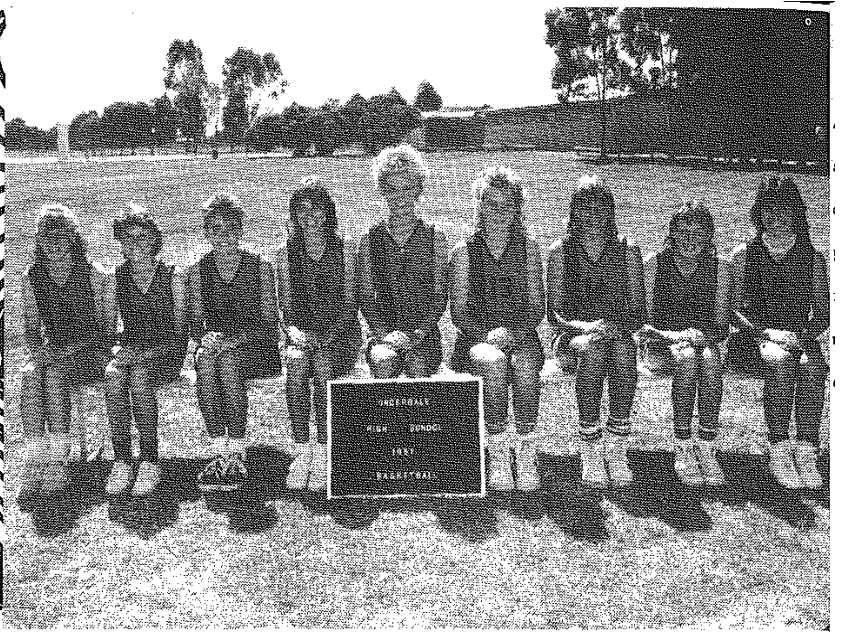

The club members have not only been working on telescopes but we have also gone on a few excursions. The one that I thought was the best was the trip to Technology Park - to the Planetarium there.

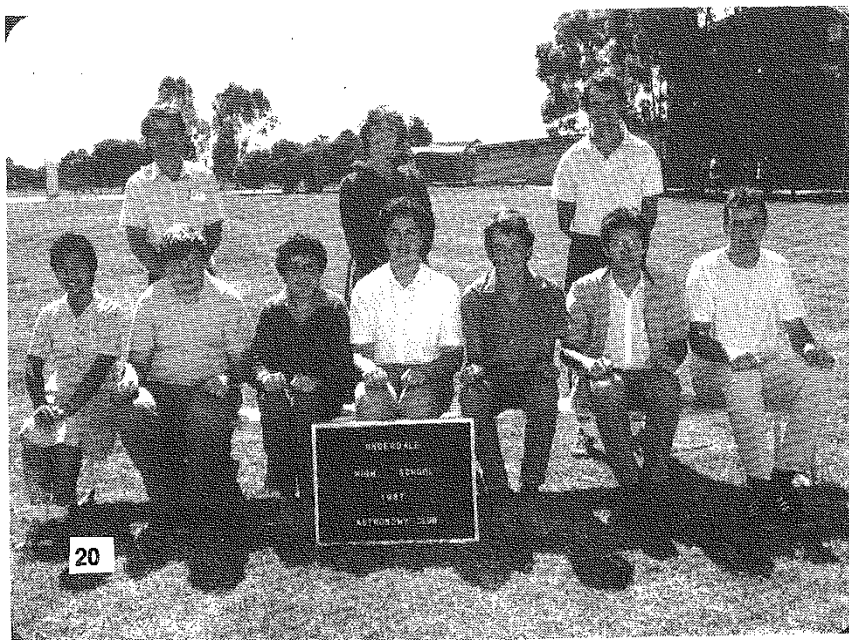
In the Planetarium, we learnt about stars, planets, and other stellar phenomena in a relaxed atmosphere. The people there presented the information in a very interesting way.

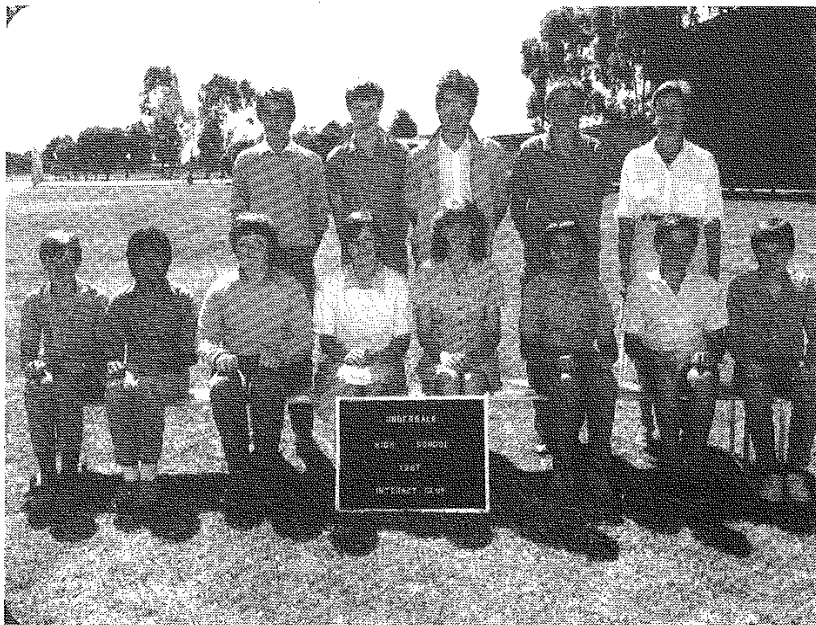

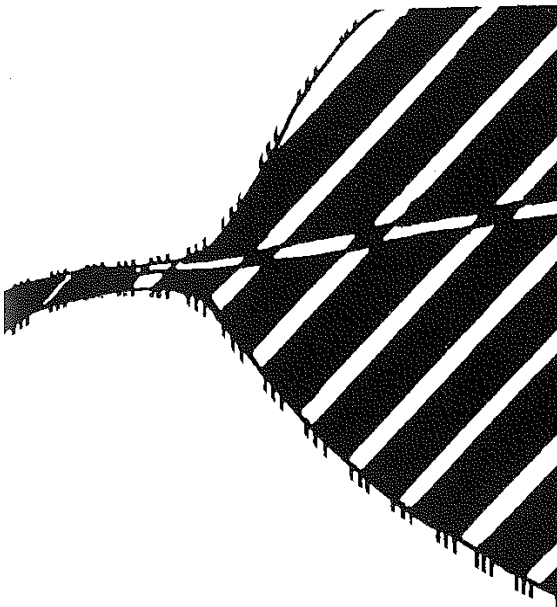
We have helped ourselves and others by fundraising. Casual days have been held at school; we helped the Phoenix Society on their badge day.

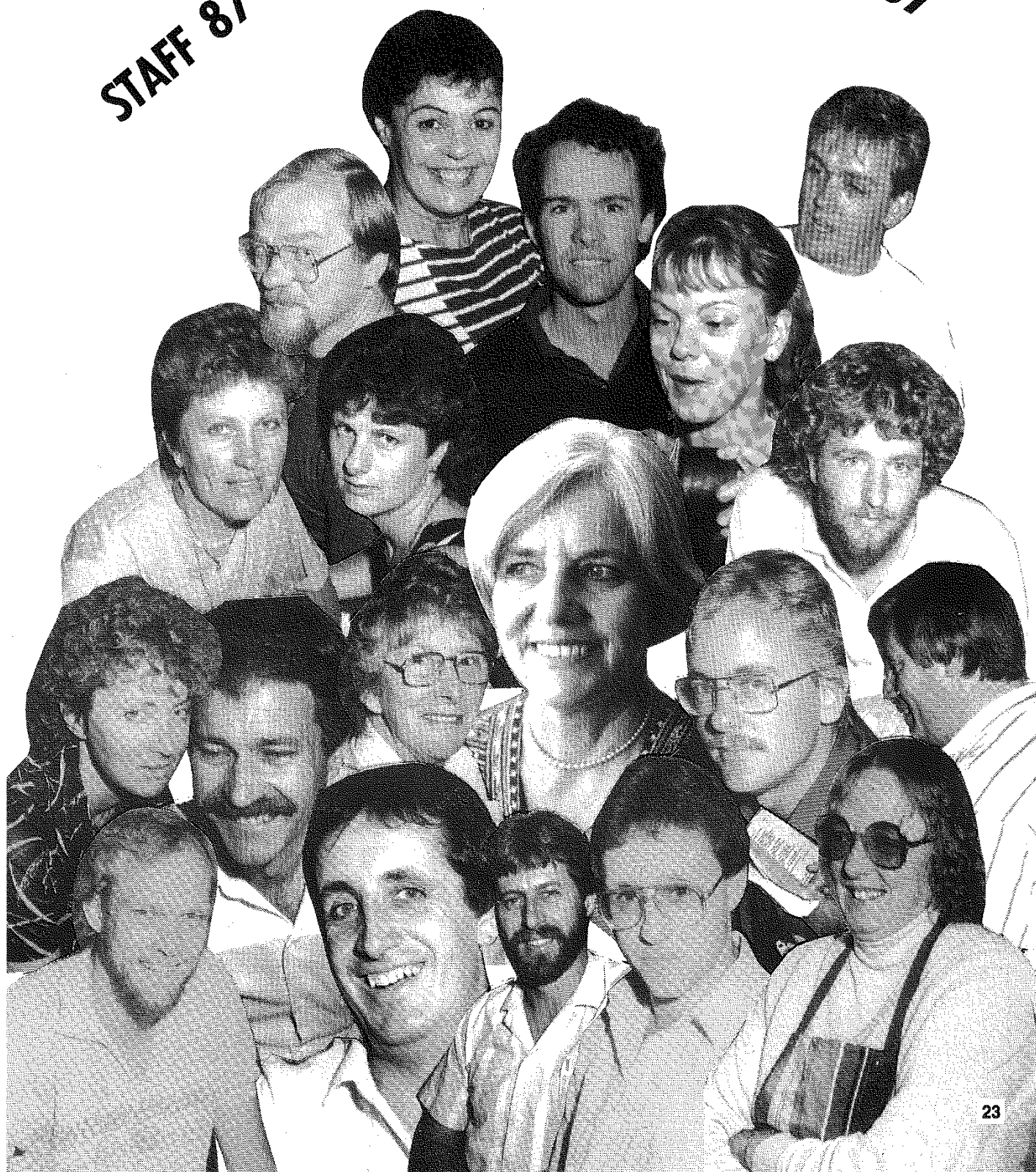
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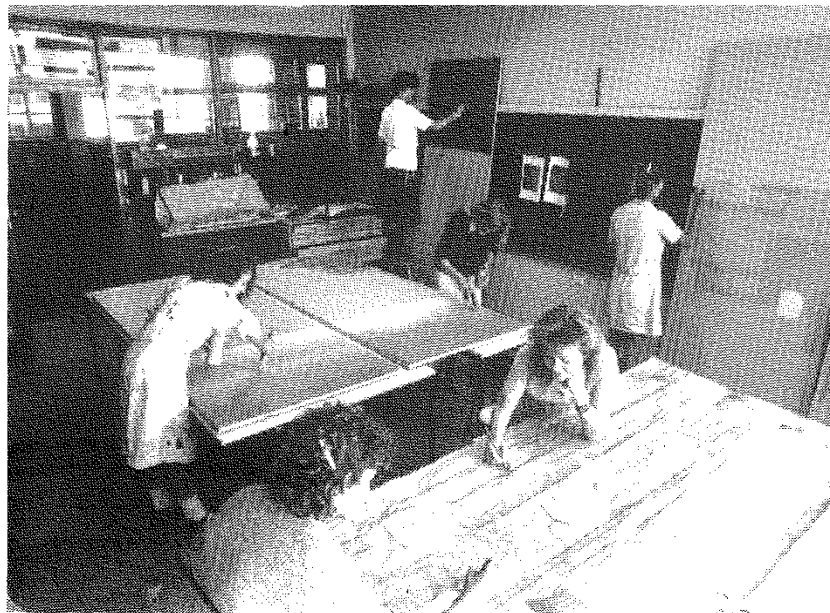












## GEOGRAPHY EXCURSION

One day my Geography class went on an excursion. We hired a minibus and went to study the redevelopment to the coast.

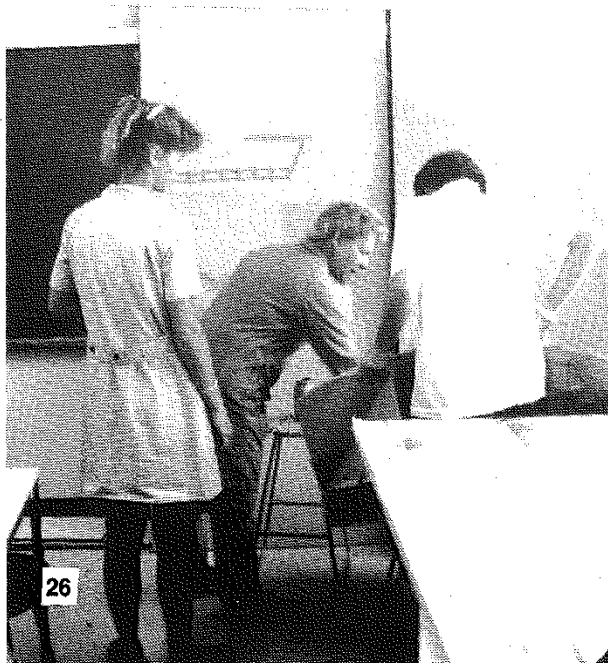

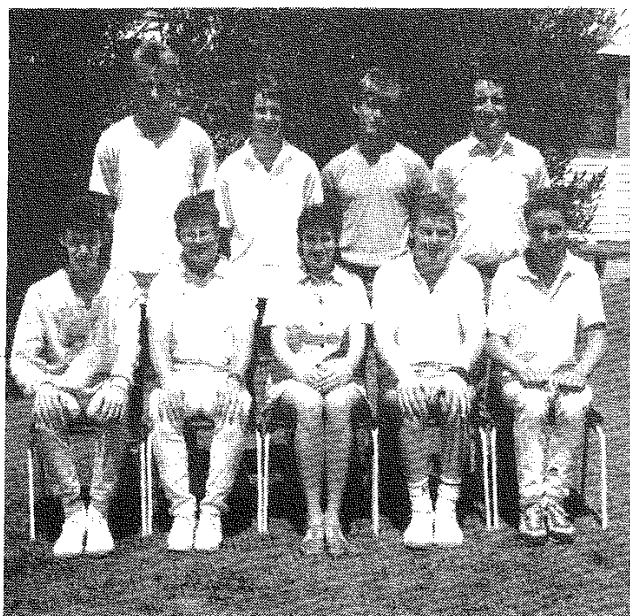
### SENIOR BOYS BASKETBALL/KNOCKOUT BASKETBALL

#### SENIOR GIRLS TENNIS TEAM

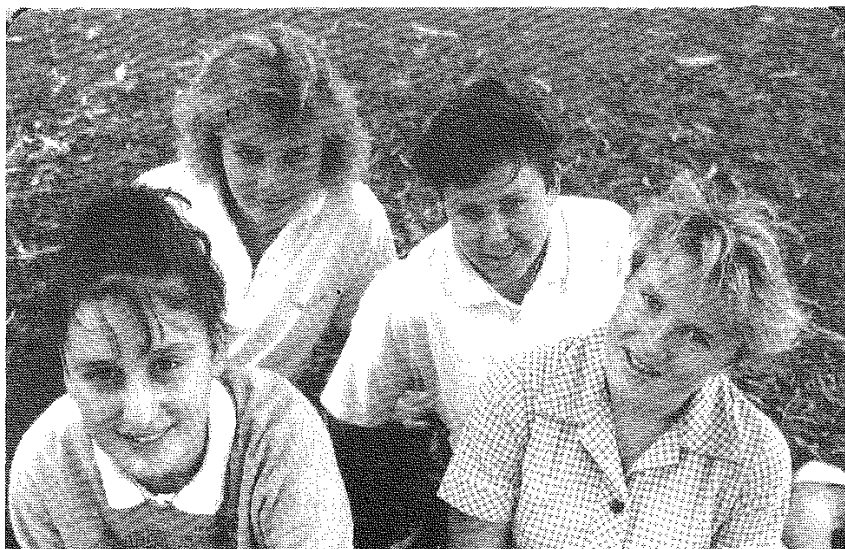

Underdale entered the semi-final against Aberfoyle Park High. Unfortunately, two of the team's fine defensive players were not available for the semi-final, due to other commitments.

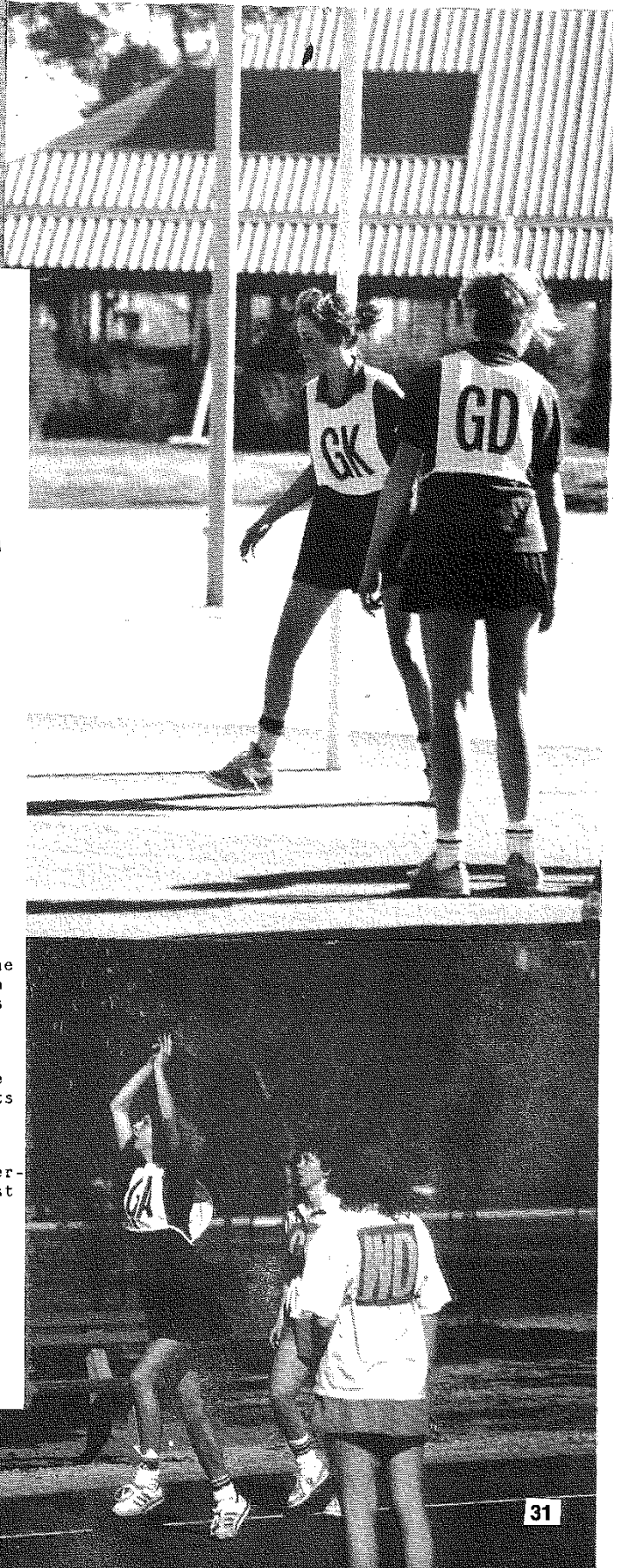

#### TRIBUTE TO MURRAY KEITH WALLACE JACKSON

It was with great sadness we heard of the death of a former Deputy Principal of the school, Murray Jackson, in late October.

Murray had a long distinguished career in the S.A. Education Department serving in many schools throughout S.A. For his last 8 years he was Deputy Principal of Underdale High School.

The one word that encapsulated Murray's personal qualities was "gentleman". For Murray had all the personal qualities expected from one who was described in this way.

Murray was a kind, thoughtful and fair man. With even some of the most frustrating and tiresome students he would temper his remarks with positive, constructive comments. He had a good word to say about most people. He was a teacher foremost and those personal qualities which are the hall-mark of the successful teacher - fairness, concern and justice - underpinned his relationships with students. Consequently he was able to discharge his role of Deputy Principal in a firm and effective way, while never generating animosity from students whose unfortunate plight was to be sent to the office to be disciplined for misbehaviour. He loved teaching and this quality influenced all of his work. It was instantly recognized, sub-consciously, by students, and quickly won their confidence and respect.

Murray was a quiet, sensitive man who was calm and unflappable even under pressure. He spoke quietly to his classes, for he did not have to raise his voice; the students were always co-operative and respectful. As he moved around the school carrying out his duties in his calm, quiet way, with an air of authority; his manner pervaded the whole school community.

Murray was an extremely conscientious person. He loved his teaching, and to work outside of school hours was no chore to him. He had a painstaking eye for detail and all of his administrative work was discharged methodically and accurately. His relationship with staff was always cordial - carried out with tact and diplomacy.

Murray was a person who put others before himself. He never shirked a duty and often undertook extra tasks, preferring not to burden others. Although he was trained as a Technical Studies teacher (a field in which he was outstanding), throughout his career he taught many subjects, volunteering to "help out" if another colleague was sick and a suitable replacement was not readily available. Murray placed team effort and completion of the task above his own individual needs.

Murray Jackson was an inspiration to us all. We count ourselves extremely fortunate that we had the opportunity of working with him. Perhaps it was symbolic that when he retired in 1981, he was not replaced by another Deputy Principal, and that his office, which is now used for an interview room, is referred to by all of his old colleagues as "Murray's Room".

He will be sadly missed by us all, but his wonderful personal qualities and the exceptional contribution he made to education throughout S.A., will be remembered with a great deal of affection by the many students and teachers who came under his influence.
