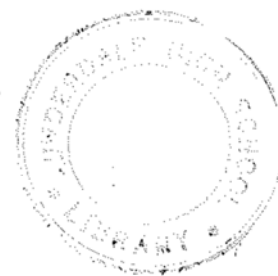

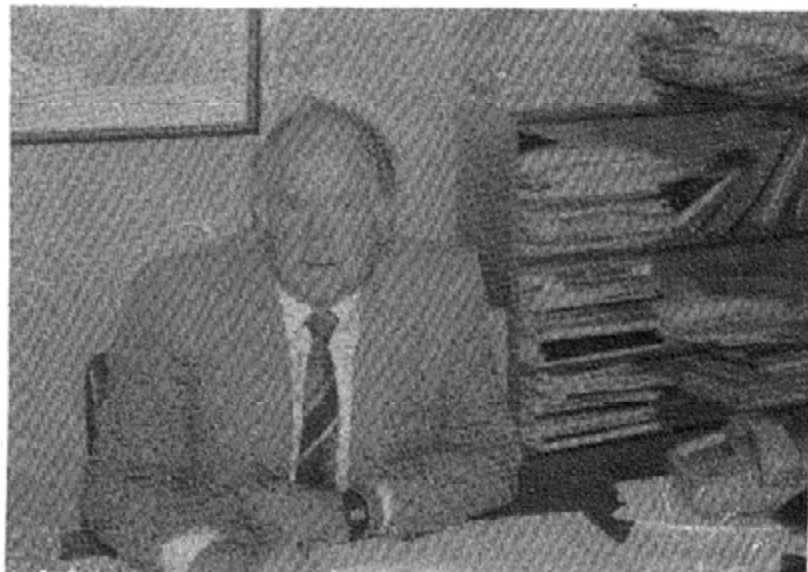

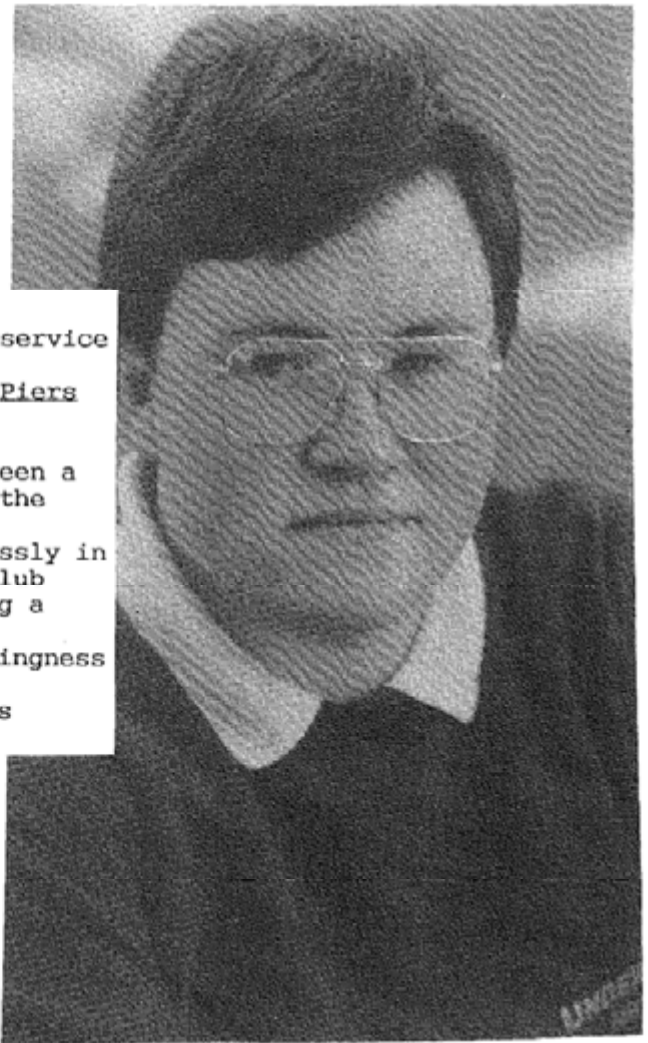
School Council Award

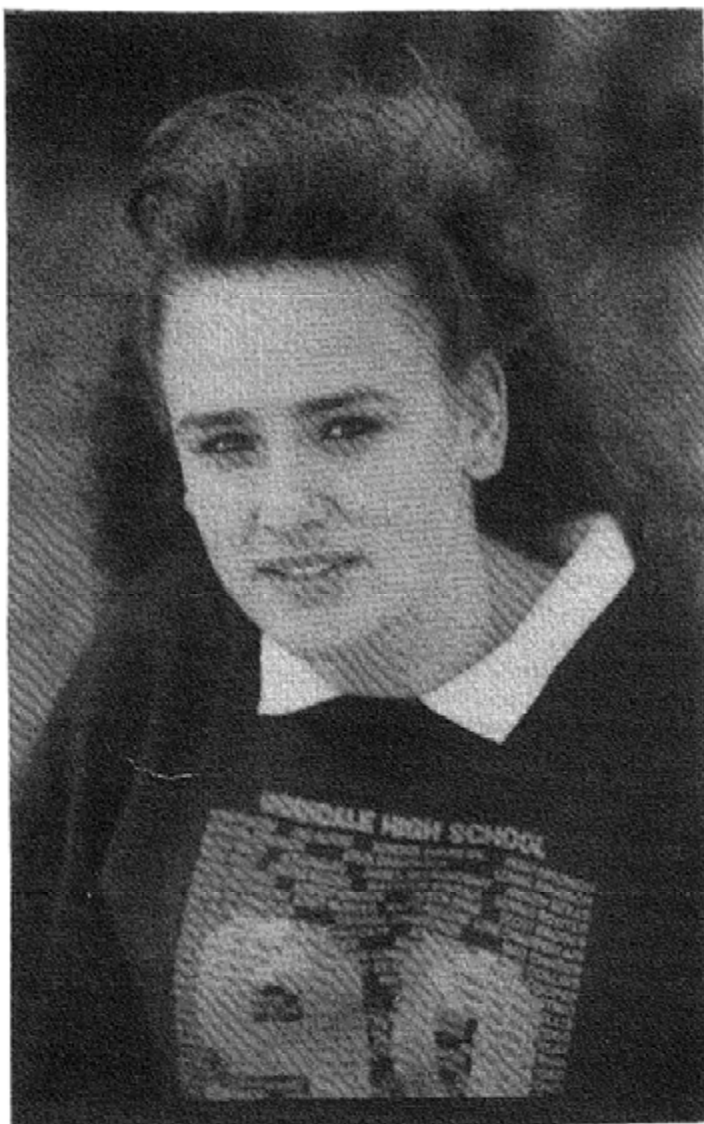
School Sports Award for 1990

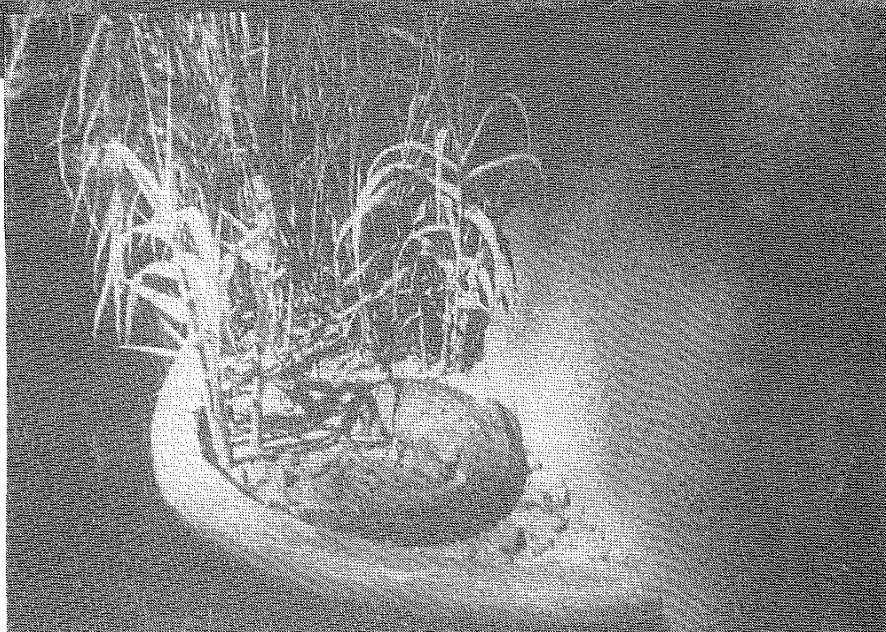
As most of our members are year twelves, we will need new, eager members in our club next year. Join us. Assist the community.

ASTRONOMY CLUB

This year the Astronomy Club has been very active. In 1988 they completed the construction of a second grinding machine. This has enabled two people to be grinding lenses at the same time.

The Astronomy Club has also obtained a spherical lens generator. This machine is now in the process of being used for the grinding of mirrors.

A high vacuum unit has also been bought and will be used to aluminize mirrors.

The Astronomy Club has been on excursions this year. One of the excursions was to the Planetarium. There we were shown the different positions of objects in the sky. The objects are projected onto a dome and the operation is able to move the objects in their different places at different times.

The other excursion was to Torrens College Telescope facility. Here we were shown ways of finding celestial objects. We were also shown how a telescope works and how to use it properly. We looked through a ten inch Newtonian Reflector and were shown different objects in the sky.

1990 has been a very busy year for the Astronomy Club and we hope to have many more.

MOCK TRIAL COMPETITION 1990

This year we again benefited from the Mock Trial Knockout Competition run by the Law Society of South Australia and the Law Foundation of South Australia. This is an interesting way of putting into practice the theory taught in the classroom.

Trials take place between schools and colleges who elect to participate, with teams consisting of two barristers, two solicitors, two witnesses, and one court official, alternating as prosecution or defence in criminal cases, or acting for the plaintiff or defendant in civil cases.

Our year 12 team did well and was not knocked out until Round Two against St Peters Boys College. It was a close contest and we lost by a narrow margin. As St Peters eventually contested and won the Grand Final, we were certainly not disgraced.

"I WAS THERE - NOVEMBER 9TH, 1989"

.....so read Berlin's most popular tourist T-shirts, although the people who buy them weren't even really "There"....Well, I was!
In August 1989 I jetted away (amidst all the pilot strikes) -
DESTINATION - WEST GERMANY. I can't even begin to describe how excited I was about spending a year in Germany as an exchange student, so let's just say - I WAS EXCITED!!

After 3 days underway (via Tokyo and Alaska) I reached the land of beer, sauerkraut and jolly people wearing leather pants, right? Wrong! I'd been in Germany 12 hours and I already hated it. We stayed in a Youth Hostel near Frankfurt and the people were arrogant, unhelpful and in general didn't want to know us (us being 63 exchange students from all corners of the globe). I couldn't turn back anymore so I just gritted my teeth, said 'ja' and prayed for the time to go quicker, until I finally moved to the area in southern Germany (Bavaria) where I'd be living for a year.

After 10 days of intense orientation, I finally arrived in my host city, Regensburg. It was the most beautiful city I'd ever seen, and I fell in love with it from the first sight. Well, I moved into a tiny village just outside of Regensburg with my host family - they were quite tolerant with me, pretending to understand my bad German even when they couldn't. The language barrier wasn't really a problem, although it caused a lot of frustration sometimes when I wanted to say something other than "I'm hungry" - which I usually did by pointing to my mouth and rubbing my stomach anyway.

After 4 months though, I understood pretty much what was going on around me.

I attended school the whole year, but was unable to do a thing. I had subjects such as Latin and Economics (those being just 2 of the 14!!) which I wouldn't understand in English, let alone in German.

In school I don't think I was very popular among the teachers because I was a disruption to the class....on the other hand it was because of that, the kids liked me!

I made some great friends at school and I know for a fact, the classroom regained some kind of order when I left!

How could I have already written so much without even mentioning my trip to Berlin! In late January, I travelled with other exchange students from my area for one week to Berlin. It was such a great atmosphere because it was right in the middle of all the happenings there. I followed the trend in Berlin and, like every other tourist, hammered out a chunk from the Berlin Wall, and I was even lucky enough to climb up on top! WHAT A FEELING!! I was, however, unlucky enough to get caught by the police. Not a problem... exchange students get away with everything.

All of West Germany have very mixed views of the reunification of the West and the East. There are political changes every day and I think everyone realises now that getting the wall down was the easy part - now comes the problem of trying to make two countries one again. All I can say is that it will take a lot of time, money and trust.

What more can I say? I feel so privileged at being the only AFS exchange student from S.A. in Germany at such an important time. I'm proud of how I coped with living in such a 'strange' land and how I not only coped, but did well. Leaving the people I learnt to love as my new friends and family was the hardest thing I've ever had to do, but I know that memories will NEVER die, and those special people will never be forgotten.

My exchange was more like a trip of discovery inside myself rather than one around the world, and I'd recommend it heartily to anyone who has the chance.

1990 Ski Trip Report

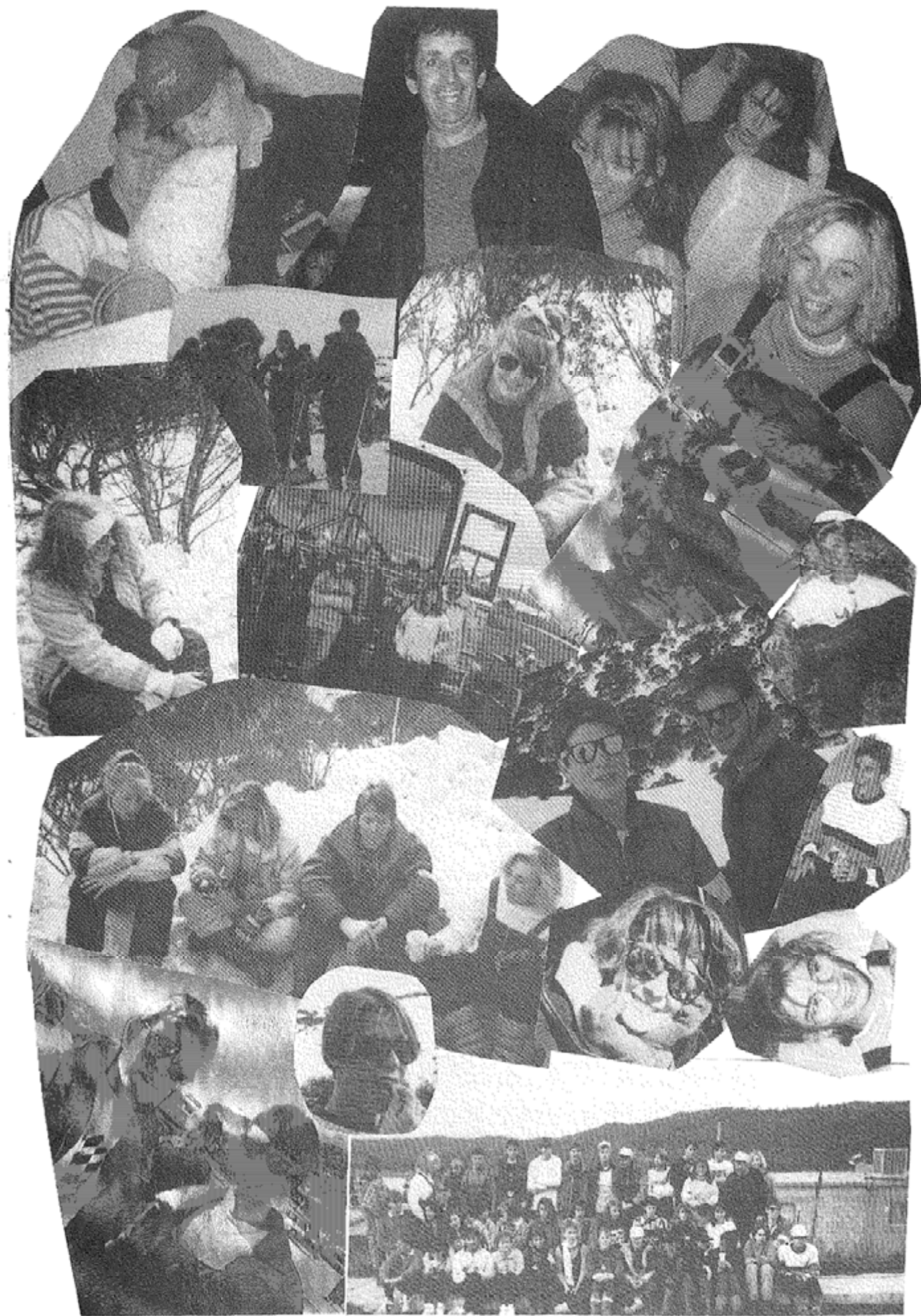

WORK EXPERIENCE 1990

Students at Underdale High School are continually making choices. One of the most important choices that he or she will make concerns a career and future employment. Information is available from many sources. Often the most meaningful and appropriate source is WORK EXPERIENCE. After one or two weeks out of school in the work place a student may realise that this particular field of employment is appropriate. The student may also have decided that to achieve in this field, a revision of his/her current progress at school may be needed.

Underdale High School Year 10, 11 and 12 students all had the opportunity to participate in Work Experience during the 1990 school year. Year 10 students ventured forth in June. They will join the Year 11's and some Year 12's in December. All Year 10 and Year 11 students were inserviced in the issues of Sexual Harassment and Grievance procedures, which was a legal requisite of the Education Department and Department of Labour.

In September, students were finalising their December placements. For some, it was the last time an opportunity existed for a student to collect a work report or reference which would be included in their Curriculum Vitae Folder.

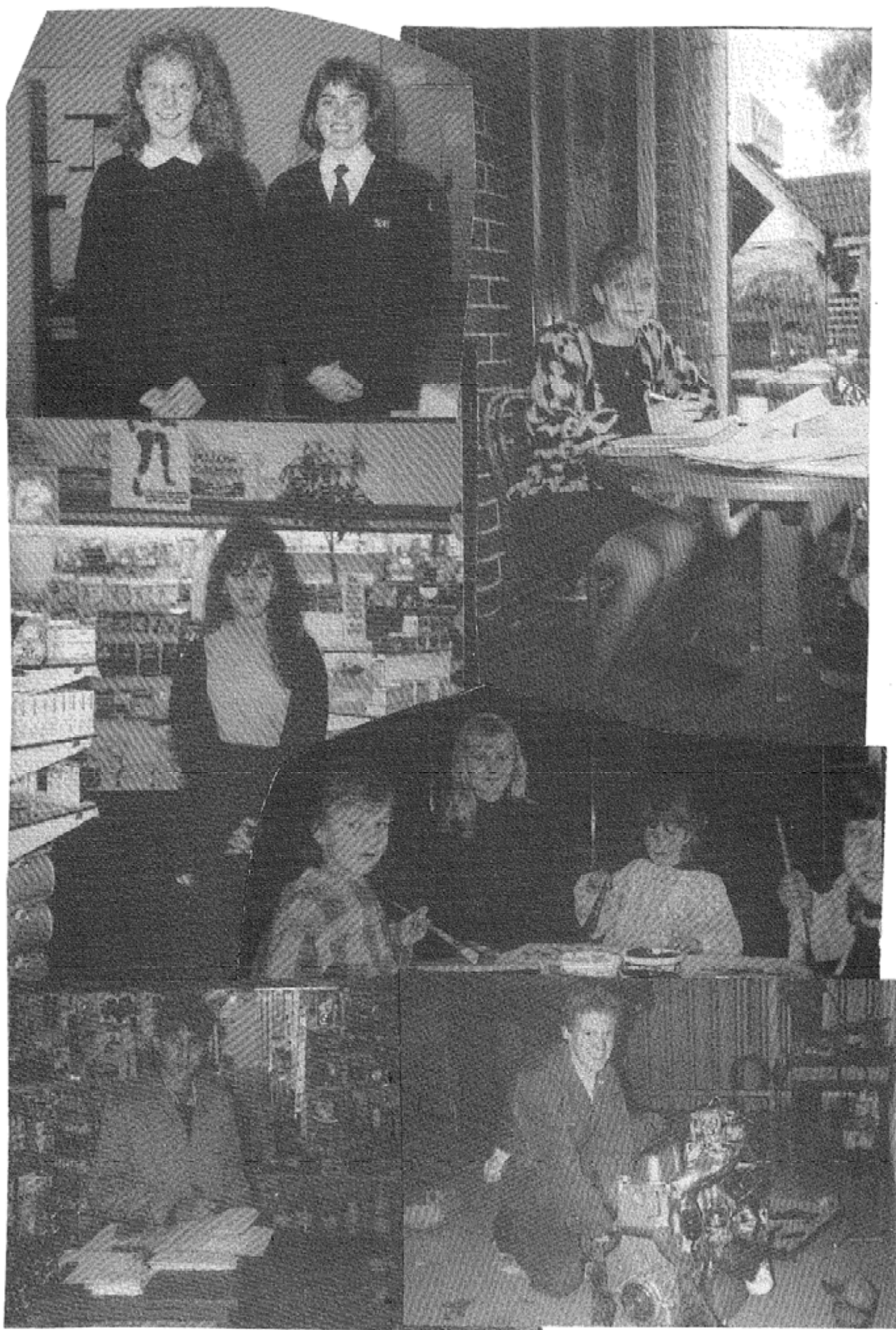

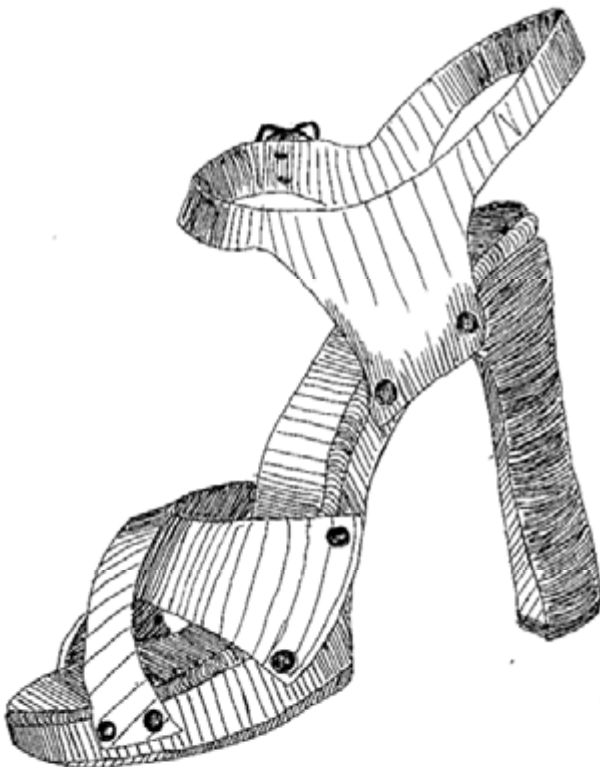




Year Eight

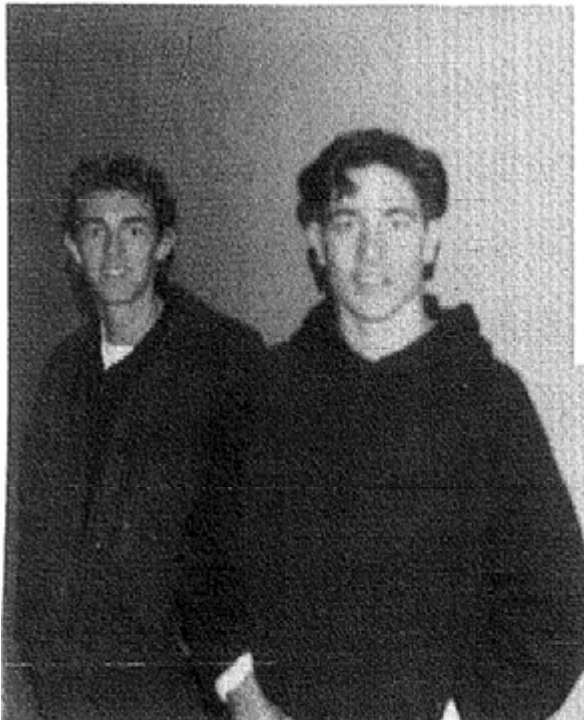
The colours were vibrant, deep and splashy but mixed in together like an artist's palette, and to every side were these people pushing and ignoring the cries from stalls all around.

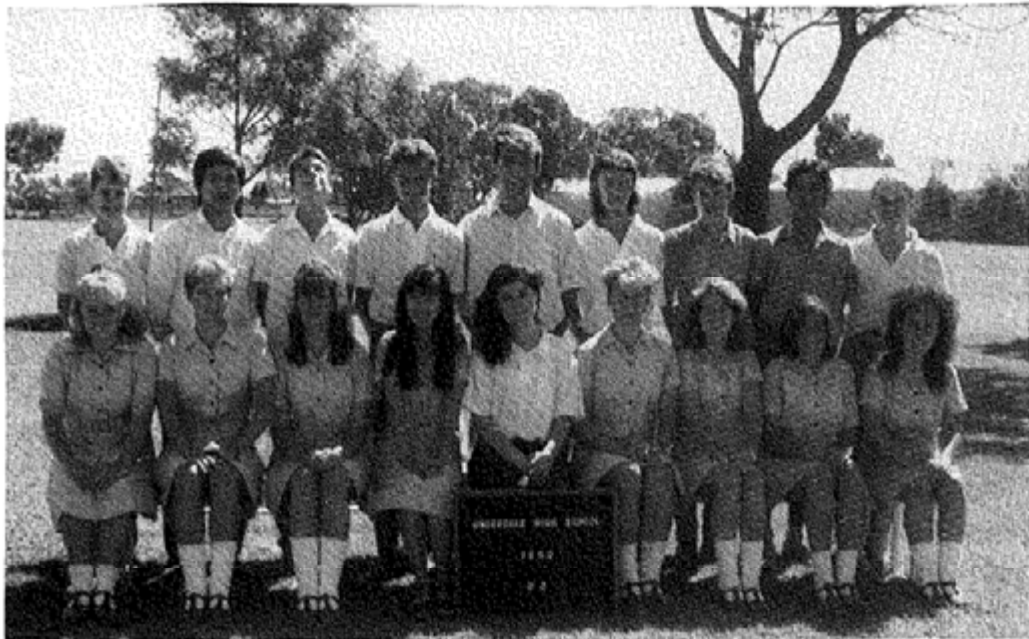

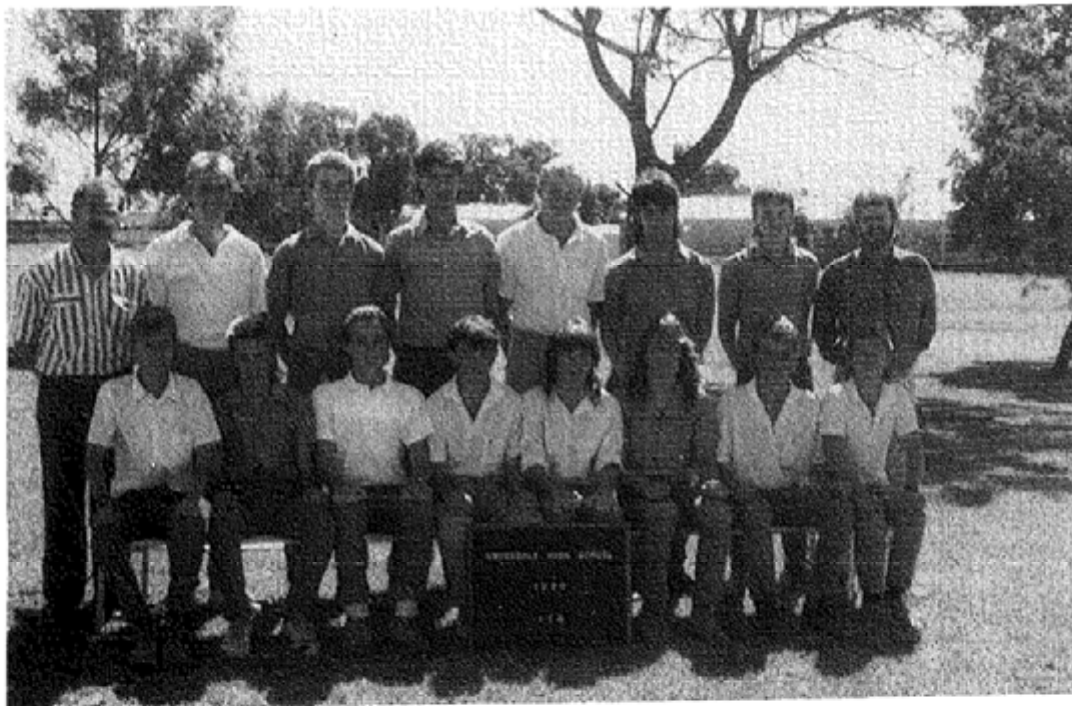

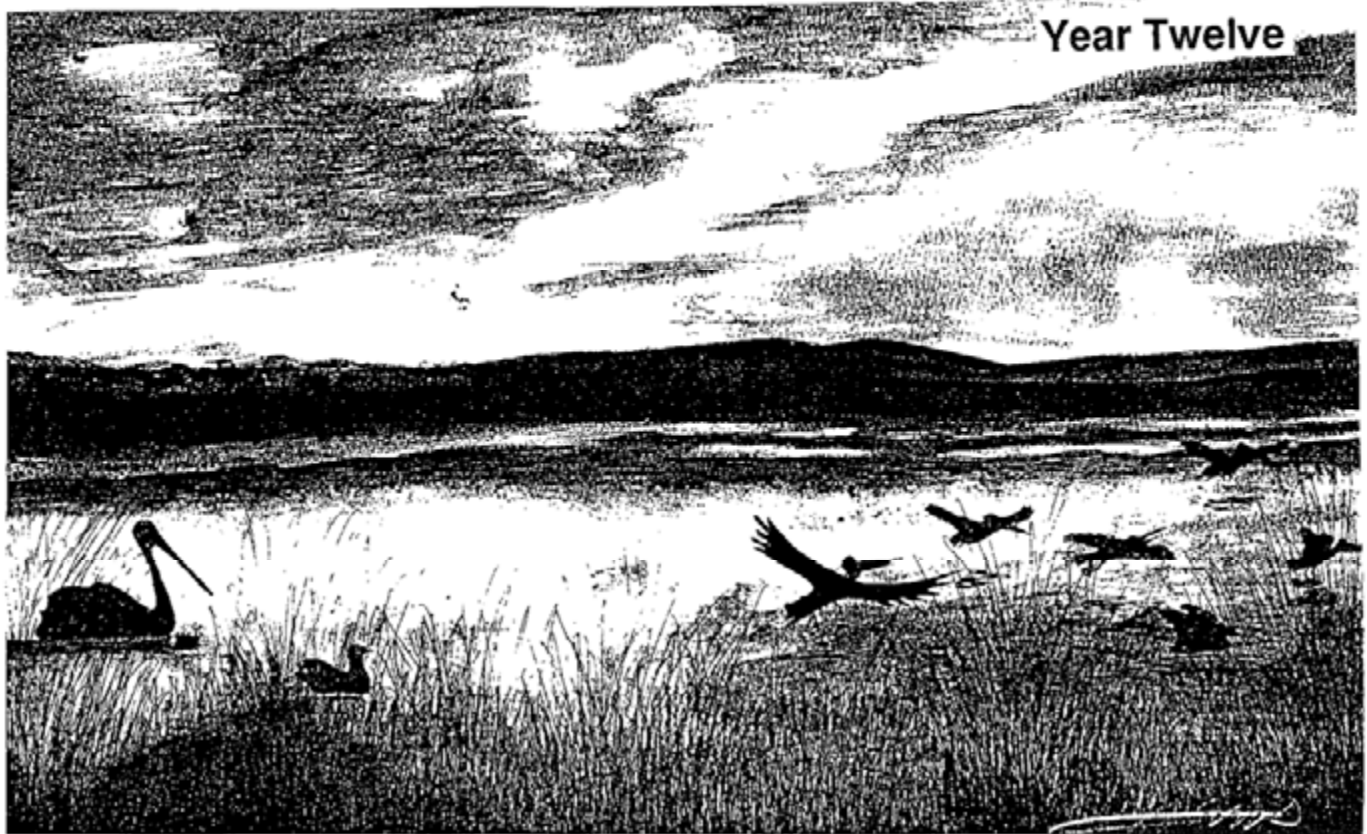

So the twelfth year of schooling has finished and there's nothing left to say except to wish them all the best for the next part of their lives.

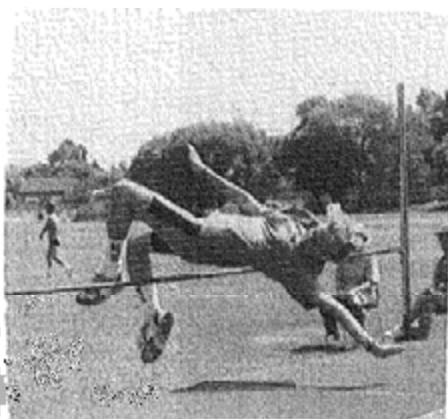

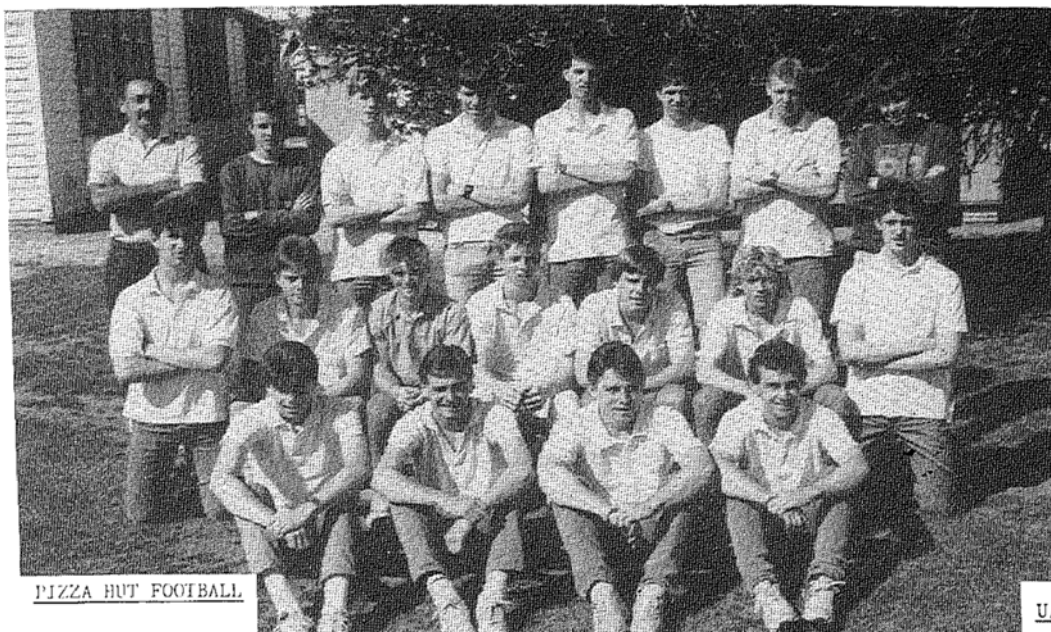
As well as the regular Wednesday sports the Athletics and Swimming carnivals, both inter-house and inter-school, were roaring successes.

Overall, it has been a thoroughly satisfying year with our students being a credit to themselves and the school.





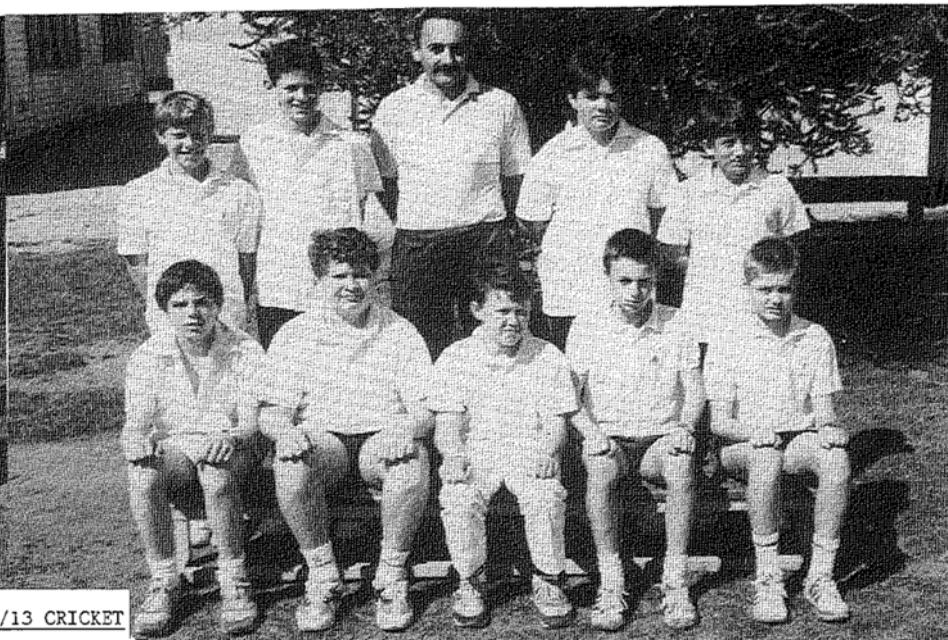

After graduating from Adelaide Teachers' College my teaching career began in 1950 with my first appointment to Snowtown and Port Broughton Higher Primary Schools. Two days a week at each school with two mornings to travel between them on the Adelaide-Port Pirie train and a bus that connected the rail siding with the coast. That bus carried everything; passengers, parcels, bags of rabbit carcasses, sundry supplies and machine parts for the farming community.

Rail strikes were rare those days but I did have to occasionally arrange a ride with the Roman Catholic Priest who travelled between schools for Religious Instruction. A huge Irishman dressed in black who drove a heavy, black bone-shaker car. He was known as "Father Flannelfeet", such a nice man but I, not knowing the faith, was scared stiff.

Snowtown Domestic Arts Centre as it was called then was a small galvanised iron outbuilding divided in the middle; the kitchen one end with its woodstove, an Adelect Electric stove of grey enamel with four curved legs, white wooden tables and little else. The laundry was the other end with its copper, troughs and scrubbing boards, a table and stools. It was lined, but the extremes of temperature I still recall. Port Broughton school had a new brick centre with modern electrical equipment for that time, so my first year was a contrast of facilities as well as accommodation, hotel and private board. I was also very busy, as besides the two schools with students from Grades 3-10 I taught dress-making to three adult night classes each week.

The inspectors called in those days; you lived in dread of them, especially Miss Elly Campbell, the Domestic Arts lady. However, she gave me maximum skill marks and I found her far nicer than her reputation.



I had a wonderful year, one I'll never forget and I always wonder why teachers hesitate to go to the country. In 1951, after my marriage, I returned to the city to teach at Thebarton Girls Technical School on Henley Beach Road; an all female school with a fine record. I taught all Home Economics subjects plus two night classes for adults in dress-making which I kept going for many years while I raised my family. Having to resign and revert to a temporary unclassified assistant was hard to take those days, just because you married and became a mother. When my youngest child started Kindergarten I returned to Thebarton for two days a week, but was quickly transferred to Underdale High School then just two years old. As the school grew in student numbers I increased my days to full-time. Tremendous efforts were made by staff, parents and students in those early days. I recall all the fundraising and working bees which went into shaping the school and its grounds to give us what we have today. The college oval was Lewis's celery patch where I've bought large heads of celery for 20c. The canteen was a classroom, and the ovals were just paddocks which in time were grassed and landscaped.

As the trees grew so did the character of the school with the efforts of so many dedicated people. I remember the rapid growth of student numbers to around a thousand and all the transportable classrooms moved in to house them. The Home Economics Centre was always a busy place, but clean and bright, and over the years the many wonderful teachers I've worked with have maintained this. It also had its moments like when I was called in one Sunday evening by a cleaner who had discovered twelve dozen eggs dripping from the ceiling, cupboards and windows etc. where someone had had some fun on a weekend break-in.

When the boys joined the girls for Home Economics it took a while for some of them to accept that dishes were part of the pleasures of eating and I think of those lads as being better husbands and fathers today because of it. Accidents were few and minor in the whole time at Underdale but I remember one boy putting the sewing machine needle right through his finger without even breaking the needle. A white face, some disinfectant and a bandaid were his to end the lesson. Duplicated sheets took over from blackboard and chalk, but homework was always part of the course at all levels.

Technology arrived and so did the microwave, and as the school grew in prestige with new subjects and equipment so Home Economics changed into a broader subject to prepare and equip children for the rapidly changing times and the problems of today. Students have more pressures now than when I started teaching, but they still need love, understanding and a guiding hand and I'm sure Underdale High School will continue this important role in education in the years to come.

I have had a long worthwhile career in teaching, and I look back with many happy memories of people and places, the friends I've made, the funny incidents that have happened, and all the hard work, but I have no regrets.



Dear Students of U.H.S.,

Many people have asked me what it feels like to have retired, to which I usually answer, that I have now entered another phase of life and still work, but in a different manner. Now I spend time operating what has been my wife's business, I get more renovations done around home, travel a little, play the weekly round of golf and occasionally do a day of relief teaching. Underdale High School has a very special meaning for me, as I grew up in the district, and knew the market gardens and the environs long before the school and the C.A.E. were built on that site. As a young boy I went to Thebarton Primary during the war years, then to Thebarton Tech. immediately afterwards for 4 years, to gain what was called the Leaving Certificate. Student counselling for careers in 1949 was not what it is today, but there was an abundance of employment opportunities open for me as a 16 year old, so I took up a cadetship in Metallurgy at Port Pirie in the Smelters. But alas, test tubes and chemicals were too impersonal to this boy who now had his eyes set on the more fulfilling career of being a 'teacher'. Well, then began a lifelong adventure in all sorts of places with all sorts of students, and working hard at night at study to complete the then coveted B.A. and Dip.Ed. My teaching career was to have me 37 years in the classroom with about half of it as a Senior Master of Geography and teaching mainly Geography, but I had taught all sorts of subjects earlier such as English, History, Science, Maths and even French. I taught for some 4 years in rural school, then gave my services to Independent Schools such as Pulteney and P.A.C., but decided I needed more excitement, so I moved back to teach in Education Department

High Schools about 18 years ago.



Over the last 7 years I have been at Underdale and have had the pleasure of teaching many fine students along with a highly competent staff and School Principal, Mr. Morley. I have really enjoyed teaching at U.H.S. and feel as if I have done many things that were worthwhile for students from Year 8 to Matriculation. Particularly, I found most joy in getting year 8 on end-of-year camps, and years 11 and 12 to the Flinders Ranges, along with Mr. Colegate and many other teachers who I wish to thank very much for their enthusiasm and hard work. Geography excursions I thought, were very worthwhile and think upon them with some satisfaction.

Anyway, now at the age of 57, I have come to realise that there is a life after teaching, and intend to have some of it, so I wish you all every success in what you do at school, and beyond, and if you see me around, please come and say "hello".
